

THE WEATHER

Toronto, June 18.—The area of low pressure which was last night centered in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, has now passed into the Atlantic and pressure remains highest in the western States. The weather has been fine today throughout Canada, being comparatively cool from the Great Lakes eastward and decidedly warm in the western provinces.

SNEAK THIEVES AT WORK IN THE CITY

No Less than Seven Robberies During the Last Few Nights—Thief in the Toils.

Sneak thieves have been getting in their work in good style in the vicinity of King Square. The fruit and confectionary store of John Speardake, Charlotte street, has been entered five times, generally on Sunday nights. The entrance has been made from the rear and some goods have been stolen.

The last break was made on last Sunday night, when a small bank was broken and about ten dollars stolen.

The pool and billiard hall owned by R. J. Armstrong on North Market street, was broken open, the entrance having been gained by the thief cutting out a pane of glass. Nothing was stolen there.

Last night, shortly after eleven o'clock, the hen-house owned by an elderly man named Gayer, who resides in the rear of the Unique Theatre, was the scene of another robbery and the children were caught in the act by the police. He gives his name as Joseph Wells and is said to be from the west end. When captured he had three live hens in a bag and three others in a basket. The hens were the best ones in Mr. Gayer's coop, Wells was arrested.
