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COMMISSIONER McLELLAN PRESENTS NEW FIRE RULES

City to be Divided Into Four Fire Districts Instead of Five as at Present—Other Changes. The amendments to the fire regulations as proposed by Commissioner McLeelan and which contain many radical changes appertaining to the government of the fire department and to the management of business on the premises, were approved at a meeting of the commissioners sitting as members of the public safety board yesterday morning. Among other things provided also, except during the adoption of the council next Monday, will result in change in the division of the city into five districts. There are to be four districts under the new regulations as follows: First District—Comprising all that part of the city on the east side of the harbor lying to the north of the centre of King street and southward of the centre of Marsh Road, City Road and Pond street and a westerly prolongation of the harbor line.

Second District—Comprising all that portion of the city on the east side of the harbor lying to the north of the centre of King street and southward of the centre of Marsh Road, City Road and Pond street and a westerly prolongation of the harbor line.

Third District—Comprising all that part of the city on the eastern side of the harbor lying south of the centre of King street.

Fourth District—Comprising all that part of the city lying on the western side of the harbor.

The following are some of the more important amendments: That the chief engineer hold office during the pleasure of the Common Council subject to the approval of the Commissioner of Public Safety, whose orders, whether written or verbal, he should obey at all times.

That the chief of the fire department may from time to time make and establish such rules as he deems expedient for the government of the fire department, provided he immediately submits the same to the Commissioner of Public Safety to be presented for approval by the Council.

Any person who shall wilfully or negligently obstruct or hinder the fire alarm or in any way prevent or delay the fire alarm, or who shall be guilty of a false alarm by telephone, outcry, ringing of bells, using of fire alarm or in any other way, shall be liable to a penalty of \$100.

No person shall put or keep in store hay or straw in loose or bale form in a warehouse on any public wharf under a penalty for each offence of \$100 and failure to cut wires and shut electric power and the like when ordered by the chief will involve a penalty of \$100.

It shall be lawful for persons retailing gasoline and the like to keep stored in their premises any quantity of gasoline in connection with their stores and two gallons if there are no dwellings.

After the amended by-laws have been adopted by the council Monday copies of them will be distributed throughout the city.

Restore your scalp to a healthy condition, first keep it clean by shampooing every ten days or two weeks with canthox, then massage the scalp, using a good quinine hair-tonic. You will find it an ideal dressing for the hair and very refreshing to an itching scalp.

S. R. O.: If your superfluous flesh proves annoying and distressing, try the following fat reducer which has given excellent results. Dissolve one ounce of patrosin in 1 1/2 pints hot water: cool strain and take a tablespoonful of the liquid before each meal. This remedy is harmless, and avoiding very rich foods and taking plenty of exercise, you will find this remedy will cut down your weight very rapidly.

My Rubs: There can be no possible excuse for a woman of your age neglecting her complexion. It is a duty you owe yourself to look as youthful and charming as possible. I would not

encourage you to use face powder; it fills off too easily, shows too readily, and does no permanent good. The use of a good lotion made by dissolving four ounces of castile soap in one pint of water, rinsing afterwards in clear water, taking away that coarse, yellow, oily look to your skin and make it soft, pink and youthful. This lotion is an excellent beautifier and whitener and will keep your skin clear and healthy. It is splendid for cold sores, chaps, pimples and preventing cracking in the winds.

Lovers: (a) Don't worry. What if your hair is a little thin, looks a little dry, or is a little gray? There is a remedy for all this. Shampoo your hair once in two weeks with a teaspoonful of lemon juice dissolved in a cup of hot water, rinsing afterwards in clear water. The thick, cleansing lather will please you.
