THE FIRST THING TO DO

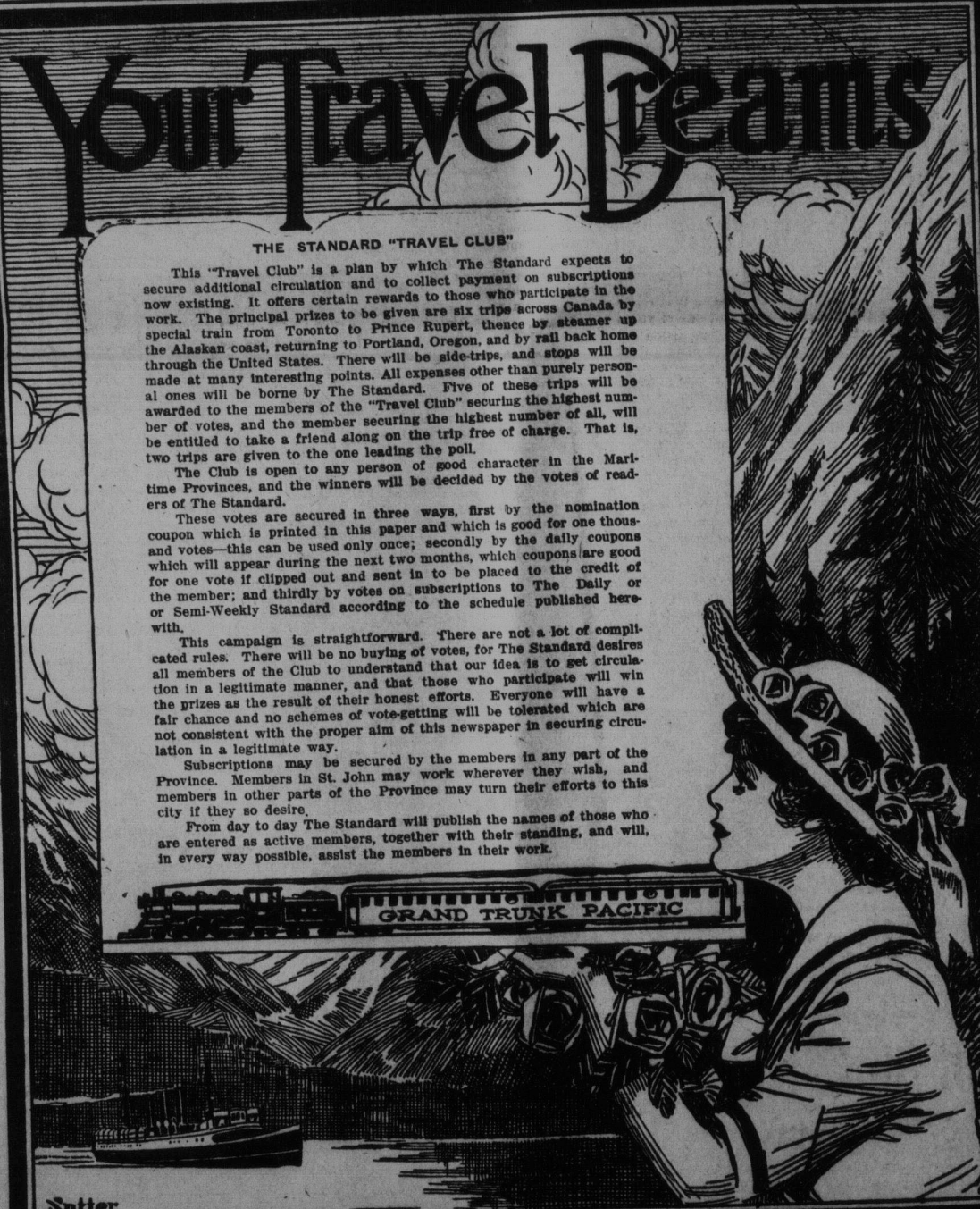

THE STANDARD "TRAVEL CLUB"

This "Travel Club" is a plan by which The Standard expects to secure additional circulation and to collect payment on subscriptions now existing. The principal prizes to be given are six trips across Canada by special train from Toronto to Prince Rupert, thence by steamer up the Alaskan coast, returning to Portland, Oregon, and by rail back home through the United States. There will be side-trips, and stops will be made at many interesting points. All expenses other than purely personal ones will be borne by The Standard. Petitodiac Red Cross.

The regular monthly business meeting of the Petitodiac Red Cross Society was held on Thursday, April 27, the president, Mrs. H. H. Magee in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and approved. Reports of committees read and adopted.

Mrs. Stone, chairman of work committee, reported 19 pyjama suits, 38 hospital shirts, 12 towels, 12 hospital kits, containing 10 articles each, 12 property bags, and 36 pairs of socks, shipped to the Red Cross Depot in St. John, since our last meeting.

A vote of thanks was moved, and carried unanimously to be extended to the Glenvale and Hillgrove sewing circles, for donation of 10 sheets, 21 towels, and 8 shirts.

An interesting article by Miss McCrea, of the Prisoners of War Department, was read by Mrs. Moran.

It was unanimously voted to send 50 pounds of maple sugar to our wounded soldiers, also \$25.00 for medical supplies.

It was moved and carried by a standing vote, that a resolution of sympathy be extended to Mr. and Mrs. Lockhart in their anxiety concerning their son, Lt. Frank Lockhart at the front, who has been officially reported missing.

The meeting closed by singing the National Anthem.

On April 28th, the girls of the Junior Red Cross sold King Albert's photographs. The proceeds of sales amounted to \$18.60, which was sent to the Royal Standard Chapter of the I. O. O. F. E. for the Belgian Relief fund.

Even the spacious rooms of the knights were crowded and many found it difficult to find a seat at the tables.
