# Will Gompers Kill Red Leadership in Labor's Ranks

As many observers see it, the calling of the steel strike at this time reveals the purpose of certain revolutionary radicals to wrest control of the American Federation of Labor from the hands of Mr. Gompers and the other moderate-minded leaders and place the Reds in the saddle, thus making it "the first gun of the industrial revolution." Senator Kenyon declares that the strike is "the first skirmish in an industrial war in the United States" and the New York Times agrees that "it is industrial war in which the leaders are radicals, social and industrial revolutionaries, while their followers are chiefly the foreign element among the steel workers, steeped in the doctrines of the class struggle and social overthrow, ignorant and easily misled." "The authority and leadership of Mr. Gompers are at stake in this strike," adds the New York Times; "He has no liking for the revolutionary element in labor; for years he has fought against it; he has known the radicals were all the time seeking to destroy him."
