MCMULLEN JAMES. (*North Wellington.*)

Second s. of Archibald McMullen, who emigrated from the Co. of Monaghan, Ire., in 1846, and settled near Fergus, Ont. B. in the County of Monaghan, Ire., in 1836, and came with his father to Canada in 1846. Ed. at the Common School, Fergus. M., 30 Sept., 1858, Mary Ann, youngest dau. of Robert Dunbar, Esq., late of Guelph, Ont. Is a merchant. Has been a Councillor and Reeve of Mount Forrest. Was, a dir. and Vice-President of the Georgian Bay and Wellington Railway, and is now a dir. of the Grand Trunk, Georgian Bay and Lake Erie Railway. First returned to Parlt. at g.e. 1882, and re-elected at g.e. 1887 and 1891. A Liberal. Supports the autonomy of each Province; in favour of reducing the number of Senators, and Parliamentary representatives, and making the former elective: opposed to a discriminating tariff.—*Mount Forest, Ont.*

MCNEILL, ALEXANDER (*North Bruce.*)

S. of the late Malcolm McNeill Esq., of The Corran, Co. of Antrim, Ire., by Louisa, dau. of the late John McNeill, Esq., of Colonsay, Argyleshire, Scot. The late Lord Colonsay, Lord Presdt. of the Court of Session, Scot., and Right Hon. Sir John McNeill, G.C.B., of Persian and Crimean fame, were brothers of his mother. B. 10 May, 1842, at the Corran, Co. of Antrim, Irel. Ed. at Wimbledon, Surrey, Eng., and Trinity Coll., Dublin. M. in London, in 1872, Hester Law Howard, dau. of the late Forbes McNeill, Esq. of Winkfield, Berks, Eng., (she d. 1890.) Is a Barrister-at-Law of the Middle Temple, London, Eng., and a farmer. First returned to Parlt. at g.e. 1882, and re-elected at g.e. 1887 and 1891. A Liberal-Conservative; for Fair Trade; for Canada, and for the Empire. As much in favor of the independence of Canada as any man, and therefore in favor of that British connection which has secured to her Freedom and Independence.—*The Corran, Wiaraton.*
