8. (a) Courses

- (i) The following courses at R.M.C., Kingston, have been announced:

5th War Intelligence Course	from 26th Oct. to 20th Dec.

9. STRENGTH OF FORMATIONS AND UNITS OF THE ACTIVE ARMY IN CANADA (as of 30th August, 1941)

(Figures in brackets refer to report of 23rd August)

(a) 4th Division

The strength was 570 (671) Officers, and 14,135 (13,723) Other Ranks. Wanted to complete establishment: 129 (128) Officers and 2633 (3045) Other Ranks.

(b) 5th (Armoured) Division

The strength was 696 (704) Officers and 12,884 (12,831) Other Ranks. Wanted to complete establishment: 59 (39) Officers and 1468 (1102) Other Ranks. The increase over last week in the numbers required to complete establishment is due to the inclusion of No. 1 Sub-Park Armd. Corps Ord. Fd. Pk. and No. 1 Divisional Sec. Armd. Corps Ord. Workshop. recently authorized to mobilize.

(c) Corps, Army and L. of C. Troops

The strength of Ancillary Troops in Canada was 348 (343) Officers and 5,237 (5,139) Other Ranks. Wanted to complete establishment: 131 (133) Officers and 736 (741) Other Ranks.
