TRAGIC DEATH BY BURNING

Mrs. John Jacques fell with Lighted Lamp and Received Fatal Injuries

Terrible Fargo Tragedy—Unfortunate Woman was Subject to Fits

Mrs. John Jacques, Fargo, was fatally burned last evening between 7 and 8 o'clock. George Rieborough, the mail-carrier between Bridge End and Fargo, called at the house to deliver a letter. He knocked at the door, but receiving no answer, and imagining he heard someone within cry "oh," he rushed to the back of the house and entered. He found Mrs. Jacques lying on the floor enveloped in flames. He quickly got her outside and tried to extinguish the flames by rolling the woman in the snow, but he did not succeed until the woman had been horribly burned. Her dress was destroyed and her corsets alone were left. She lived till 2.30 this morning, when she expired. The woman suffered terribly.

Mrs. Jacques was subject to fits and as she was alone in the house, the cause of the tragedy can only be guessed at. It is thought that she must have had a fit and struck the lamp. Her two daughters and a young man named Budder lived with her, but they were out visiting the neighbors.

Mrs. Jacques was married, but separated from her husband two years ago. They formerly resided at Bridge End.
