GOSSIP.

A managing editor out in Allentown, Pa., sent a new reporter to the track the day Prince Alert equalled the half-mile record of 2.034. The scribe became very poetic in his excitement, and gave vent to his feelings thus: "Prince Alert paced smoothly and steadily, his hoofs striking the clayey course with rhythmic regularity. Seen through the fence railings, his feet twinkled like the stars at night or as the shimmering moonbeams dance on rippling waters. It was the very poetry of motion."

Chas. Escher, Jr., Irwin, Ia., writes: "Imp, Leader of Dalmeny belongs to the substantial old Drummy Lucy family, a family that has moulded fashion of its own since the early days of Angus lore. A better bred Drummy Lucy bull never stood on legs than Imp, Leader of Dalmeny. His own sire, Plutoer of Dalmeny, was second-prize bull at the Highland Society Show in 1899 with six extra strong entries in the field, and that he was a great bull is proven when we know that he was only turned down by the greatest of Great Britain bulls to date, Diaz. His grandsire, Edenhall, was first-prize bull at the Yorkshire show, and received the gold medal for the best animal of the breed. Lady of Dalmeny, a daughter of the prizewinning Marquis Murray, second-prize at the Highland Society Show in 1893. The lowest-down and wide-out calves we saw in Scotland were the yearling bunch of heifers owned by Mr. Matheson, of Heriot, Shooestanes, Midlothian, near Edinburgh. All were the get of Imp, Leader. Father had secured him from Mr. Matheson the previous year. The longer you use Leader the more you will think of him, for I know what you can expect of him."

The Scottish Farmer, of October 22nd, has the following to say of the stock selected by Dr. Henderson, of Carberry, Man., some of which is consigned to Mr. John Graham, also of Carberry: "There were shipped from Glasgow, per Donaldson Bros. S. S. Parathina, on Saturday, 32 head of horses, 23 of which were Clydesdales of the very best of breeding and quality. They were from Mr. Robert Graham, Bridgeland, Selkirk, and consigned to his brother, Mr. John Graham, Carberry, Manitoba. Mr. Graham was assisted in selecting in this shipment by Dr. Henderson, V. S. Carberry, Manitoba, who is an authority on the Clydesdale, and has owned some champions. The Clydesdales are from Stranraer in the south to Aberdeen in the north. From Mr. Marshall, Bridgebank, there are several stallions of great size and substance, including gets from well-known horses and mares. Amongst the females is the filly which stood first at Newton-Stewart. A beautiful filly, with the best of bone and ankles, and well set up, she should prove a good investment. It took a long price to tempt Mr. Marshall to sell this mare, and we trust she may have good luck on the other side. From Aberdeenshire goes a good sappy mare from Mr. Watson, Old Craig, and a colt foal by Royal Chaffan, a thick, well-made filly from Mr. Chas. Gamons, and two colts of good breeding—Prince of Loughton and Norman, which should take well in Canada. From Mr. Harper, Mathieside, is a yearling filly, out of his great prize mare, and like making a grand brood mare, and also a filly and colt from Mr. Durno, Mains of Glack. This shipment is likely to do credit to the breed on the other side, and we hope it will reach its destination in safety. There were also shipped by Mr. Graham a stud of Shetland ponies, headed by the great prizewinner, Norman, a perfect beauty, from the stud of Mr. Archibald Connelough. He was bought by Mr. Graham at Earlshall sale in September. Norman was third at Perth, second at the Royal, and first every other where shown this year, and he should make a good foundation for Mr. Graham to start with. The other ponies from Mr. Archibald's stud are good. Mr. Anderson, of Hillwick, Shetland, all of good type, and the best of breeding. Dr. Henderson took also a pair of Grey Hares, two stallions, and a pair of mares, from Mr. Marshall, Stranraer. The mares have plenty of arched backs, and set on good legs. The stallions are from Mr. Morton's stud in Aberdeenshire, and are very straight, and have a good deal of bone, and with good points."
