MR. ROWELL AND HIS CLUB

Says it is Non-Political - A Statement From the President.

TORONTO, March 3.—Newton Wesley Rowell, K.C., took occasion yesterday afternoon in the House to explain the position he holds in the Ontario Club, which has a club liquor license in full blast and which rejoices under a Liberal patronage. He drew special attention to an article in the London Free Press concerning his connection with the club, which he claimed was "entirely without foundation."

He made no attempt to deny his membership in the organization, but stated that he was no guardian of its conduct and could voice only the opinions of one member. The three members of the Opposition beside himself in the House at the time applauded vociferously but the Government side met the argument with laughter, particularly his efforts to show that the Ontario Club is non-political.

His statement was as follows: "My attention has been drawn to a statement appearing in the London Free Press that the Ontario Club is official headquarters of the Liberal party, and that I am primarily responsible for the proper conduct of the club. I presume this statement must be based upon the suggestion of the honorable member for West Hastings in this House the other day, though the honorable member did not go so far as The London Free Press."

"Permit me to say that the statement is entirely without foundation. The Ontario Club is not the official headquarters of the Liberal party in this province. It is a social club, organized in the same way as the Albany, the National or the Toronto clubs. Its membership is composed of both Liberal and Conservative. I am neither an officer nor director of the club and have no more say in its management than any other of its more than 500 members; and on the other hand, the Ontario Club, as such, has no say or voice in shaping the policy of the Liberal party."

"I believe it is an exceedingly high-class and well-run club, but like all the other leading clubs in Toronto, it has a club license. 'The honorable member for West Hastings asked the other day if I had been doing anything to get this license canceled. Permit me to say that I have been doing my best, not only to secure the abolition of this license, but the license of every club in this province. My regret is that I have not received any support in so doing from the honorable member for West Hastings or any other member on the Government side of the House.'

What President Says.
TORONTO, March 3.—"The Ontario Club is a Liberal club," said P.C. Larkin, the president, last night, referring to the statement as to its political hue made by N. W. Rowell yesterday. "A candidate for membership is told that it is a political club, as the Reform Club, of London is Liberal or the Carlton, of London is Conservative. A man to be admitted a member does not have to swear he is a Liberal, but if he were pronounced Conservative he would not be elected. However, many members are not pronounced in their Liberal

views, but applicants, if not connected with any political party, would be admitted. But it is primarily a Liberal organization formed by Liberals to further Liberal principles. The club was opened by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and every Liberal minister of his Cabinet has addressed the club."

PONY CONTEST AT COLONIAL

Manager Symons Has Launched a Unique Contest at Popular Theatre.

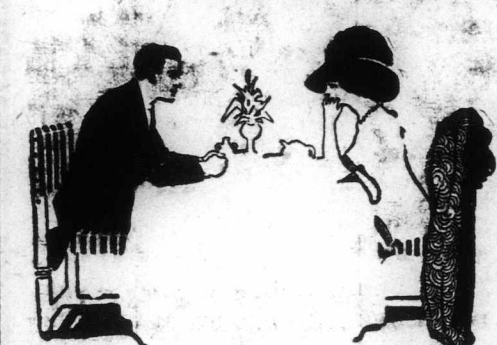

EAGLE LODGE OF THE A.O.U.W.

Held a Very Successful Initiation Last Night—A New Lodge

A very successful initiation night was held by the Eagle Lodge No. 106 of the Ancient Order of United Workmen at the Temple Building last night. The occasion was the first meeting since the inauguration of the new lodge and it was very largely attended from the city and surrounding districts. Amongst those present were Superintendent Armstrong of Toronto, Master Workman Watson of Brantford Old Lodge No. 71, Mr. Plows, Past Master Workman, and Organizer Morris of Toronto. In a brief speech Master Workman Watson outlined the advantages and privileges of the order and his efforts were an eloquent testimony to United Workman's Lodge. He concluded by inviting all present to the next meeting of the Old Lodge No. 71, and his kind invitation was gladly accepted. Mr. Plows then spoke and endorsed the previous speaker's views and he paid a high tribute to the good work done by the lodge. Responding, Mr. Morris, organizer, of Toronto, thanked them for their kind remarks and said he would continue in the future as in the past to apply himself diligently to his task. Superintendent Armstrong then took up the reins and spoke. He was gratified with the strides that the new organization had made since its inception and he was confident of the success which would attend its inauguration. The solid foundation of the lodge structure was a good and significant omen. Since November when the lodge was formed, some forty members had been accepted, sixteen of whom were received into the lodge last night. In a charming little speech she suitably replied and thanked the lodge for their kindness. At the Brant.

One of their number is fired into the air from a cracker with an immense explosion; and for juggling, head and hand, balancing and a number of difficult feats see this trio. They take the house. Van and Clark are acrobatic dancers of no mean order, and he of the two is exceptionally smart in some of his grotesque and astonishing acts. They had a big share of the night's encouragement. Mack and Elmer, in a comedy talking and singing act, add to the attractions of a very fine bill which is certainly worth while seeing.
