Excellent Show of Public School Work

The excellent exhibition of public school work at the Conservatory was opened for inspection yesterday afternoon. Several of the senior girls poured tea for the guests after they had conducted an examination of the fine work of the school children.

HOUSEHOLD SCIENCE

The first section of the exhibition was that of household science in charge of Miss MacNally. A large table of delicious looking cooking and refreshments had been made by the young girls themselves under the di- rection of Miss MacNally of course. It was plainly evident by the quality of the cooking that the girls had re- ceived perfect instruction and teach- ing during the course. About two hundred models from a full course Canadian dinner was also the work of the ingenious girls. A splendid array of white caps and bags, all carefully sewn and embroi- dered, was also the work of the house- hold science classes.

Returning for a brief moment to the attractive cooking table, the lunch basket and invalid tray are worth special mention. This was the first year that the lunch tray was shown and to be congratulated, as well as Miss MacNally, for the splendid showing made.

MANUAL TRAINING

Then came the boys' manual train- ing exhibition, under the direction of Mr. A. Styles. It was a very large and excellent showing of the boys' work. Only the very best of the work could be exhibited, and Mr. Styles had taken great pains in inspecting and arranging the work. The hun- dred models could not be shown for lack of space. An almost unbelieve- able fact was that all the work had been done since last October, only a few months ago.

Several pieces of work are worthy of special mention. Undoubtedly the best was a beautiful electric lamp and medicine chest, done by Norman Andrews. Several other splendid pieces of workmanship were done by George Adams, Bruce Kerr, Morley Beckett, Bruce Irwin, Norman Arm- strong, Howard Matthews, Richmond Sutherland and Jack Duncan. China stands, mirrors, plate racks, electric lamps, a French cabinet, the rustic bird houses, shoe boxes, stools, tabourettes, sewing baskets and coun- tless other fine exhibits were shown.

Then came the mechanical drawing, also done by Mr. Styles. Only about a tenth of the drawings were exhibited, and among these the work of Silverthorne, Baden Powell, Clement Harris and Arthur Hart was especially good. Mr. Styles has taken wonderful strides and leaps forward. His classes have been greatly enlarged necessitating much extra work from him in his spare time. In the last few years there has been an increase in his time, he has taught his boys with such skill and patience that this year's exhibit has been greater and far superior to any previous exhibit.

That is saying a great deal, for during the term of manual training instru- tor Mr. Styles has turned out some excellent work from his school. The splendid exhibition held at the old V. M. C. A. several years ago, may be well remembered as one of them.

ART

The third section of the exhibition was the art and drawing of the classes in Dufferin School, taught by Miss Shannon. This art was done by pupils of the second, third and fourth grades. The work was divided into sections in which nature work, landscapes, object drawing, figure and animal poses design work from plants, etc., were all splendidly ex- ecuted. The work was done in water color, brush and ink and charcoal. The object perspective drawings done by the senior fourth form, are especially good as are the Christmas booklets. Especially interesting were the Hal- lowe'en designs. Calendars, window shades and designs for book covers were also exceedingly well done. Tints and shades of colors, and black, brown and gold lettering were also shown from the excellent ex- hibition as worthy of mention. Miss Shannon received many compliments from friends on the fine work her pupils have made.

This exhibition is being held this afternoon and evening, through the kindness of Mr. and Mrs. Norman Andrews. One pleasant feature of the evening was the scores of people who attended the affair.

PRZEMYSL IS THREATENED WITH SIEGE

Austro-German Armies Have Driven Wedge Through Galicia.

By Special Wire to the Courier. London, May 28.—The fortress of Przemysl, garrisoned this time by Russians instead of Austrians, is once more threatened with investment.

Just as the Russians, after surround- ing Przemysl and starting out its Austrian garrison forced the surren- der of the fortress on the 22nd of last March, so Austro-German troops, who have driven a wedge through Central Galicia, are now attempting a double flanking movement, and with growing intensity of attack, are seeking to en- circle Przemysl from the north and the southeast.

According to Vienna reports progress is being made in both directions and if the advance is not checked Przemysl will either be isolated from the rest of the Russian army, or the Russian troops will be forced back to the San will be forced into further retreat.

This situation in Galicia is unquestionably of great strategic importance at the present time and even the British press concedes that the position of Przemysl is serious. It is described as the key to the whole Russian position in Galicia, and its fall will mean that the railroad running eastward to Turin, the main artery of the Russian supplies in this region will fall into Austrian hands. Reports that this railroad line already has been severed are still without confirmation to-day.

Fighting along the Austro-Italian frontier still is in the development stage. There is virtually no change on the western battle front, and the British and the French admit that the Turkish army is so strongly entrenched on the Gallipoli peninsula that only siege warfare can be waged there.

BLEW UP AND LEFT NO TRACE

C. P. R. Steamer Irene Blown Into Atoms by Explosion.

By Special Wire to the Courier. London, May 28.—No trace has been found of a harbor steam launch which was moored alongside the Princess Irene, or its crew of five or ten since the explosion which destroyed the big steamer, and it is assumed five more names must be added to the list of dead.

One possible survivor of the explosion is in a hospital suffering from shock. He was picked up in the water some time after the explosion, but it has not been learned whether he was a member of the Princess Irene's crew or was blown out of some small boat near by. Only one body has been re- covered. Two barges which were also alongside the Irene were demolished.

A naval officer who witnessed the explosion, said in describing it: "The ship was moored seventy yards from the point on shore where I was standing. Suddenly I noticed a little wispy of smoke aboard and called out, 'Is there a fire there?'"

"Before the men could answer there came an explosion like a volcanic eruption. Then a great cloud of dust, coal, smoke and flame rose a mile high. Amidst the smoke the eye could discern huge pieces of the ship burst- ing into smaller pieces as they rose.

"The ship didn't go down, she went up, distributing her remains in dust and jagged fragments over a radius of many miles. The smoke cloud of the explosion lasted, I think, only a moment or two. I rubbed my eyes and saw clear air where the Irene, barges and launches had been a moment before.

"The explosion seemed to stun everyone for a few minutes. The came the order, 'away all boat crews to pick up survivors.' But when I got into a boat and sailed past the spot where the explosion had occurred, there was nothing but a singl- ing fragment of mast to mark the place. Further away, however, the water was dotted with pieces of wreckage."
