Story of Evangeline

The lecture given in Music Hall last Monday evening by Rev. A. T. Kempton on "Evangeline" for the benefit of the small pox sufferers was fairly well attended but we were a little surprised in not seeing more. The lecturer was introduced by Mayor Yoild.

The lecture was illustrated by over a hundred views which were highly colored, every one being plain so that they could all be recognized. These were taken at Grand Pre, the scene of the expulsion of the Acadians, last summer and have been highly commented upon by critics in the New England States. When these were shown one could hear some one say there is so and so, but when the middle and pathetic part was reached, the feeling that we were looking at pictures of our townspeople died away.

The lecture throughout was very interesting and the pictures shown were the best we have ever seen. The picture of Miss Grace Patriquin of Wolfville was excellent and the work done by Mr. Hardy in taking these pictures deserve the highest compliment.

Supreme Court

Last Tuesday the June sitting of the Supreme Court for Kings opened in the Court House, Kentville and as in session two days. Judge Meagher of Halifax preside.

The following barristers were present:—Messrs. W. E. Roscoe, A. Drysdale, T. R. Robertson, W. P. Shaffer, H. H. Wickwire, B. Webster, A. E. Dunlop, F. A. Masters, C. A. Tufts and E. J. Morse.

The grand jurors present were Alfred Elderkin, (Foreman), Robert Harvey, Stephen Kidston, Leander Fuller, A. Duncanson, Harding Killam, Arthur Neary, D. A. McDonald, C. R. H. Starr, Nathan Loomer, and John Dow.

At 10.30 Judge Meagher addressed the jury in King vs Woodworth and also called their attention to the charges against E. A. Brown, formerly of Wolfville for stealing.

The jury retired and brought two true bills against Geo. Woodworth for criminal libel and also a true bill against the latter.

Mr. Robertson made a motion for the appointment of a referee in the cause of the Confederation Life Insurance Co. against E. A. Brown.

The three cases of Roy vs. Sharp were settled out of court.

The cause Illsley vs. Kinsman and Palmer was for trial. Shaffer and Robertson for plaintiff, Roscoe and Dunlop for defendant. The following jury was empanelled for the cause W. W. Neily, Foreman, W. Lee, Otis Margeson, F. Ellis, Frank Dickey, J. M. W. Hutchinson, Geo. Whalen, J. M. Sanford and Ezekiel Bishop, after evidence being given, the jury retired and shortly after gave a verdict of damages to the amount of \$2 for the plaintiff.

Court opened on Wednesday morning at 9.30 and proceeded with the trial of King vs Woodworth. A. W. Drysdale appearing for the prosecution, Webster and Tufts for prisoner.

The jury on this cause was, W. W. Neily, Foreman, W. Illsley, W. Lee, D. Lockhart, Benj. Parker, F. Ellis, C. Howell, J. M. Sanford, J. W. Hutchinson, H. Illsley, O. Margeson and Ezekiel Bishop. The jury failed to agree and were sent back twice by the Judge, but they failed to agree.

Mr. Woodworth was obliged to furnish bail for his appearance at the next session of the Supreme Court for this case. It is expected that the libel suit will take place in Oct. time being granted for witnesses to be brought from Montreal.
