THE BLANCHARDS OF CANADA.

A Re-union of the Family near the old
Homestead at Greenbush.

About 90 years ago a young married
couple left the parental homestead in a
quiet little town a few miles from
Boston, Mass., to seek out a home in
the then almost unknown wilderness
of Canada. In those days there was
no fast express train that would land
them at their destination in a few
hours, but instead, they had to travel
by wagon, many weary miles being
traversed over roads nearly in a state
of nature. Six weeks had to be spent
in the forest, over on ruts, and the
journey, which to-day could be ac-
complished in a few hours, then took
nearly as many weeks. It was in the
early autumn when John Blanchard
and his bride of the wedded life, far
from home and kindred. They had
sprung another brother came to the
settlement, and the two laid claim and
title to 400 acres of land in one block,
part of which is still owned by a great
grandson. Here the Blanchards
grew and prospered, and to-day the
descendants are numbered by the
hundreds and are scattered over Canada
and part of the States. All the Bl-
anchards in Canada are, as far as known
descendants of John and Aaron.
A couple of weeks ago Mr. Daniel Bl-
anchard left her home at Friend, Ne-
braska, for a short visit to friends and
relatives in Canada and New York
State, and shortly after her arrival
William W. Blanchard also dropped
down amongst his old friends to enjoy
a short visit with them. As Mr. Bl-
anchard had to leave on Friday for home,
a few of the friends concluded to get
as many of the Blanchard family to-
gether as possible and spend an after-
noon in social enjoyment. The beau-
tiful grove of John Lovrin was se-
lected for the gathering, and no more
fitting place could have been found, as
it was within a few rods of the old
homestead of the A. Blanchard family.
Here about 75 descendants, relatives
and friends of the family assembled on
Wednesday afternoon last, and spent
three or four hours in social intercourse.
After partaking of a dinner served in
the best style, and before the tables
were cleared, Mrs. David Blanchard
gave a reading suitable to the occasion.
We might add by way of conclusion
that the descendants of John and
Aaron Blanchard, now numbering sev-
eral hundred, have and are occupying
some of the best positions in the land.
Amongst the number are lawyers, doc-
tors, ministers, members of the Legis-
lature and other important officers.
As far as known there has never been
one of the descendants of the old
pioneers convicted of a criminal of-
fence.

THE Provincial Fair.
The electric light system has been
introduced in the buildings and on the
grounds.

The telegraph offices are located at
either end of the palace.
Seats for weary people are located
about the grounds, and water-taps
will be conveniently situated.

Fakirs are absolutely prohibited in-
side and outside the grounds. This
will be sad news as the sharps were
anticipating a harvest from the inso-
lence.

The facilities for conveying goods
from the railway stations to the fair
grounds were never better. The com-
panies have largely increased their fa-
cilities as to the cars every demand.

There is now sufficient accommoda-
tion for all the cattle at the fair. Ad-
ditional buildings were erected last
week. There are over 530 entries of
the finest cattle in Ontario, including
the pick of Short Horns, polled Angus
Herefords and Ayrshires.

Lord Stanley, of Preston, and suite,
will be the guests of J. B. Carruthers,
at his father's residence corner Syden-
ham and Earl streets. The vice-regal
party will arrive on the afternoon of
Sept. 12th, and will be received with a
salute of nineteen guns. There will
also be a military display. He will
