Women's Institute Recipes

We have arranged with the Athen ranch of the Women's Institute to publish a number of practical recipes contributed by members. The follow ing are timely :-

White Fruit Cake 1 scant cup butter, 2 cups white

sugar, I cup sweet milk, whites of 5 eggs or 3 whole eggs, 2 cups shredded ocoanut, 1 lb. almonds (shell and blanch), 1 lb. citron peel, 5 cups sifted flour, with 3 large teaspoonsful of baking powder. Add fruit and flour last. Bake about one hour.

Rich Fruit Cake-Dark

10 eggs, 1 lb, butter, 1 lb. brown sugar, 2 lbs raisins, 1½ lbs currants, 1 lb dates, 1 lb figs, 1 lb almonds, ½ lb lemon peel. I b citron peel, I cup blackstrap, I cup fruit juice, I tea-spoon soda. I tablespoonful cloves and nutmeg, 4 tablespoons cinnamon, 6 small cups flour. Mix sugar and butter, add eggs whole, one at a time, Mix with hand. Bake in moderate oven 3 hours.


