During the past three months Le Progres, a French weekly, published in Windsor by Aurele Pacaud, has contained articles attacking both William McGregor and M. K. Cowan, the representatives of Essex county in the Dominion Parliament. The last issue contains a cartoon which pic-tures McGregor turning the crank of tures McGregor turning the crank of a hand organ and W. J. McKee, M. L. A., dressed as a monkey, holding out a cup for votes for McGregor in the coming Liberal convention. The following explanatory note appears be neath the cartoon: "Political Dago McGregor playing his plaintive wail, while his monkey Billy solicits the votes for the convention, which is approaching threatening and unmerciroaching threatening and unmerci-

In the same issue there is an editorial on the coming election and in discussing the situation in North Es-sex, the editor has the following to

"McGregor ought to retire gracebecause nobody wants him. He is la-belled N. G. (no good) by the entire electorate. There is some talk of Messrs. Samson, Sutherland or Pa-caud succeeding him. Of the three, Mr. Sutherland is the only one who Mr. Sutherland is the only one who has made great efforts to obtain the convention and is working in uously every day with that objective."

and, in fact, they have been the cause of some very tartly expressed opinions as to why Pacaud is giving the Liberal party the worst of it when he has frequently received favors at the hands of the party.

A conversation took place between two Liberal politicians yesterday in connection with the articles in Le Progress, and one of the men expressed his opinion in a very decided man-

ner. He said that he could not understand why Pacaud was continually harping about the French-Canadians not receiving any appointments to office. The government offices in Windsor are very equally divided, as there are, some men who lived in other counties when they received their appointments, and therefore could not be classed as Essex county men. Essex cannot demand more than its share of the offices and, tak-

than its share of the offices and, taking into consideration the percentage of French-Canadians in the county, they have received their share.

"Pacaud had no kick coming," said one of them. "He has his printing plant in a government office and secured the privilege of using this building from the Liberal government. He pays but \$12 per month, and as government property is not taxable. and, as government property is not taxable, he has an office for which he would pay any landlord from \$30 to \$50 per month, besides

the taxes and water rates.

"I am speaking of the weights and measures building which faces on Chatham street next to the postoffice building. There is a fine green lawn in front which is attended to by the janitor of the postoffice and there is also a cannon mounted on the green

But it is the same way every election. Pacaud starts in abusing our party before the election and keeps it up until he gains his point. I believe that he has created more trouble for Liberals than any other man in North Essex and if I had my way in the matter, I would read him out of the party and would tell him to do his worst. I do not think that the influence his paper is supposed to have can offset the broils he gets the party in, and the sooner he is dropped the better it will be for all concerned. There is no danger of the Conservative party taking up with him, as they had a trial of that some years ago to their sorrow. I sincerely trust that our next candidate, whoever he may be will, at the commencement, handle Pacaud without gloves and be done forever with a man who has the interests of no party at heart unless it be also his own interests."


