RIFLE CLUB IN WINDSOR.

Dr. Borden, minister of militia, has

intimated to F. D. Davis, of Windsor,

that the government will permit the

organization of a rifle club in Wind-

sor and Mr. Davis will at once pro-

ceed to procure members for the pro-

posed organization.

The enlistment will be for three

years and the members of the club

will form a reserve force of the mil-

itia for the defence of Canada in case

of war. The department will supply

the rifle for every forty members of

a club and each member is entitled

to 200 rounds of ammunition yearly

for practice without cost.

At present such a club in Windsor

will be handicapped, there are no

rifle butts in the county. However

the officers of the Twenty-first Essex

Regiment are in hopes that the gov-

ernment will purchase a suitable

range at Tecumseh, and if this is

done the rifle club can have the use

of it.

SEETHING MASS

Of Disorder and Alarm is German Cor-

respondent's View of Cape Colony.

London, August 31.—The Cologne

Gazette's correspondent in Cape Town

declares that the entire Cape Colony

is a seething mass of disorder and

alarm. He asserts also that the

Boers are receiving support from all

sides.

In the early part of August a cor-

respondent of the Morning Post had

a long talk with Lord Kitchener,

from which he gathered that "it is

not Lord Kitchener, but the govern-

ment that is to blame for many of

the present evils." Lord Kitchener,

it seems, complained that the Home

Government continually worried him

about trivial details, "merely to reply

to parliamentary heckling," and this

compelled him to enforce a strict cen-

sorship over telegrams, although per-

sonally he objected to the present

system. He said he thought corre-

spondents ought to be given great

liberty and to be made responsible for

their statements.

DISCREDITED

Salisbury Resignation Story Believed to

Be a Fake—Will Remain Premier.

London, Aug. 30.—An official, who

for over 30 years has been more closely

associated than any one else with the

late Salisbury, said to-day: "I have

not heard a single word of the story

of Salisbury or his friends to justify

this latest resurrection of the retire-

ment rumor. It is true Lord Salis-

bury is getting very old, but he is

now relieved of all his duties, and

foreign affairs, which were formerly

so trying. They do not think he is

very eager to retire, but what is more

to the point, I feel certain the party

will not allow it, unless a good

reason is given. Salisbury has made

far greater progress in his health than

it has at present. I think you will

see Lord Salisbury Premier so long as

his health lasts and a Unionist Gov-

ernment is in power. Personally, he

has no pursuit to which he desires to

devote more leisure. Indeed, I be-

lieve he would feel quite lost without

a certain amount of statesmanship to

occupy his energy."
