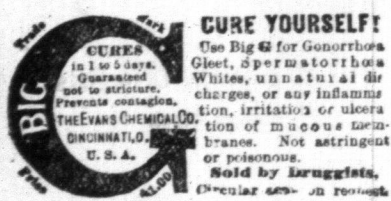

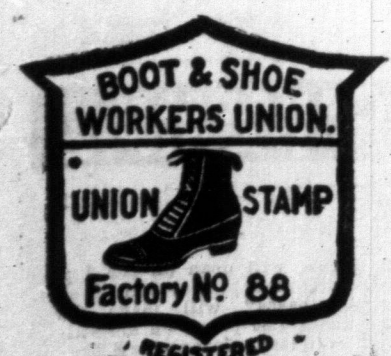

JEALOUS WIFE KILLED HERSELF

Mrs. Friedberg, a St. Louis Woman, Took Poison and Gave Some to her Two Little Girls.

St. Louis, Mo., May 1.—Mrs. Fannie Friedberg, wife of a well-to-do German, locked her husband out of his house last night and then swallowed poison, dying shortly after midnight. She also gave poison to her two daughters, Emma, aged nine, and Alma, eight years old. The latter died at 3 o'clock this afternoon, but Emma may recover. The children were given poison in ice cream prepared by the mother.

When Arthur Friedberg, the husband, came home shortly after eight o'clock on Sunday night, his wife refused to admit him, telling him to go away or she would shoot herself. He went to a neighbor's and remained for the night, coming home this morning, only to find his wife dead, one child dying and the other suffering greatly from the poison she had taken.

Unfounded jealousy is said to have been the cause. Mrs. Friedberg being nearly crazed when her husband spoke to another woman. She left letters behind accusing him of being untrue to her, and another to the police, telling where they would find \$1800 she had saved out of her household money and requesting that they burn it rather than her husband should get possession of it.

PAN-AMERICAN IS NOW OPEN

Turnstile Clicked Yesterday Morning for First Visitors to Rainbow City.

Buffalo, May 1.—The gates of the Pan-American exposition were thrown open this morning, and notwithstanding it had rained all night and the weather conditions were threatening, large crowds were gathered at each of the gates, and as the morning brightened the various routes to the grounds were well patronized by those who desired to be present at the opening.

At 8.30 o'clock the turnstiles clicked and the first of the millions of people who will visit the beautiful rainbow city during the six months of its existence, passed into the grounds to view and study the products of American ingenuity and scientific research and the resources of the two continents of the western hemisphere which fill the magnificent buildings, beautiful in their architectural design, harmonious in their coloring and interior decoration.

No ceremonies marked the opening of the gates, it having been decided by the management to combine the opening day ceremonies with those of dedication day, May 20. The change in the date, however, did not cause a moment's relaxation of the strenuous efforts being put forth by every one connected with the exposition to have everything as nearly ready as possible for to-day's opening.

The appearance of the buildings and grounds this morning bore ample evidence of their efforts. Storm and the inevitable delays incident to any undertaking of this magnitude, made impossible the realization of the hope that this might be the first of the great exhibitions to be complete on its opening day. But so much more has already been wrought than was deemed possible at the inception of the project that all are satisfied with the extent and beauty of the fair as it appeared this morning, carried through from beginning by the citizens of Buffalo without state or federal aid.

MANY INJURED IN A COLLISION

Excursion Train Struck Millionaire's Car in California Train Shed.

Emigrant Gap, Colo., May 1.—In the darkness of the smoke of the snow-shed a Raymond excursion train ran into the rear end of the limited train No. 2 at Yaba Pass, four miles east of here last night. The private car of D. O. Mills was badly damaged. Fireman Jas. Saunders, of the Dallas, Ogn. was instantly killed and many passengers on both trains and men of the train crews were badly injured. The limited and the excursion train were in the rear of their car when the crash came, all were more or less bruised and scratched. Whitelaw Reid received an ugly cut in the face. No one was seriously injured.

The limited had struck a rock in the sheds and was delayed until the second collision caught up. The engine was crushed between the tender and engine. The baggage car climbed over the rear tender and shot up against the roof of the snowshed, knocking a section of the shed. The limited abandoned D. O. Mills' private car and proceeded eastward.

POOR WAY TO ECONOMIZE.

Mistakes Often Made by Women Who Trim the Wrong Expenses.

"It is most difficult to economize, and in what direction to practice economy," said the wise woman. "Often those who do it will carry their economy to too great an extreme. The right way to do it is to get along without extras, and use just what is necessary for everyday comfort. It does not mean that there should not be enough, nor any deprivation of necessary comforts."

"There are women who when they economize will do so at the wrong end. She comes to the conclusion that when ever she doesn't buy anything or cuts off an item of expense she is economizing. She will attend to the grocer's bills. That is well, but sometimes she will expend 20 cents' worth of time and strength to save 5 cents. Then the same woman may economize on her luncheon. She will concoct herself that eating a midday meal is a mere habit, and will dispense with it. She finds it all the easier to do so because her husband is not home at that meal, and, of course, she does not want him to go without enough to eat. She thinks that he needs more food than she does."

"The woman who practices this sort of economy will find that the deprivation impoverishes herself and her children mentally and physically. Often, in the long run, it is more expensive in actual cash, for the doctor has to be called in."

Value of Old Newspapers.

"Dear me," sighed the perplexed housewife, "I don't know what to do with the stacks and stacks of old newspapers which accumulate at our house."

"Well, don't throw them away," counselled her friend, "for they are of more value than one would think at first glance. I have found so very many uses to which I can put them in my home that I make the men folks save every scrap."

"In the first place," she continued, "old newspapers dipped in cold water will clean windows almost as well as hot water, soap and cloths, and will not injure the hands one-half as much. Besides, for polishing mirrors there is nothing better than a newspaper which has been crumpled and rolled about in the hands until it is as soft as fine leather."

"After the cooking is over I make our girl crush some old newspapers in her hands and rub the top and sides of the range. This removes the grease quickly and keeps the range in excellent condition if done often."

"Every morning we rub our hair brushes with a pad of newspapers. This removes the dust and keeps the brushes clean and healthy. Also, it conduces to their long life and utility."

"Tearing old newspapers into shreds of a given length is an employment which I find amuses my children greatly, and keeps them out of mischief. What possible use can I find for the shreds? Why, a great many. They can be put into washing ticks, and, if frequently changed, make a good comfort bed for a small child. They are also excellent for packing fragile summer things away, as good as excelsior and practically cost one nothing. Perishable fruit laid away in boxes surrounded by shreds of old newspaper will last almost indefinitely."

"As a substitute for paper felt under carpets the old newspapers come in handy, and one may have as thick a covering of them on the floors as one wishes, by simply saving up for a few weeks."

"These are only a few of the uses to which I put our old newspapers. It would require a big book to tell of all the things I do with them, and of the many dollars I manage to save every year by simply preserving them into service wherever available."

Teach a Child to Think.

Frobel's "Mother Play" book is full of the richest suggestions as to how the every day life of the nursery can be made to yield up its treasures of oil and wine, goodness and truth, for both baby and mother. He shows us baby and there that while it is easy to keep in sympathy with child-nature, and for many mothers to provide for the varying needs of activities, yet that to really understand the origin and end of this activity and earnest study of the human mind in its individual and social relations is also needed. The mother must learn that thought and feeling, as well as nerve and muscle have their pulsations, their rhythms, their periods of greater or less activity. We must learn that to try to work against these laws written in the whole being of the child is but "kicking against the bricks." She will learn that just as there is seed time and harvest, and the work of the one period cannot be done except in that period, so the child cannot be made to take on certain states of mind and heart. To take up certain studies when he has not yet reached the time in which such mental or heart nourishment is demanded is but to block the wheels of a true, logical, orderly development of all the faculties. She will learn that the child's interests cannot be ignored and other interests foreign to his present stage of growth substituted for his own. She will study books like Donelson's "Growth of the Brain," or Warner's "The Study of the Child," to find a true physical basis for education, and then strive to gain a clearer, larger view of all those psychologic questions which bear on mental development. To this will be added a true knowledge of those principles which make for a better understanding of the child as a spiritual being. It is not hard to do all this if you will look at life from the child's standpoint, giving him your own loving instructive sympathy.—Women's Home Companion.
