Toronto Live Stock.

Toronto, April 9.—Receipts of live stock at the City Market since Friday, as reported by the railways, were 59 car loads, composed of 923 cattle, 683 hogs, 217 sheep and 217 calves.

Exporters.

Montreal Live Stock.

Montreal, April 10.—(Special).—Receipts, were 300 cattle, 50 milch cows, 50 sheep and lambs, 200 calves, 1500 hogs. In spite of heavier supplies of hogs and easier advice from the west, the undertone to the market was steady and prices show no change. The demand from local dealers was good and an active trade was done at \$7.25 to \$7.50 per cwt, weight off cars.

There were no prime beefs on the market and all kinds of fat stock were held at higher prices, quality considered. Pretty good cattle sold at \$c to \$c and the common stock at \$c to \$c per lb. The milch cows were nearly all lean in flesh; the prices ranged from \$25 to \$45 each. Calves sold at from \$1.50 to \$7.50 each. Most of the calves were brought to the market on farmers' sleighs, a thing never seen here previously so late in the season. Sheep sold at \$c to \$c per lb.; spring lambs, at \$3 to \$5.50 each.

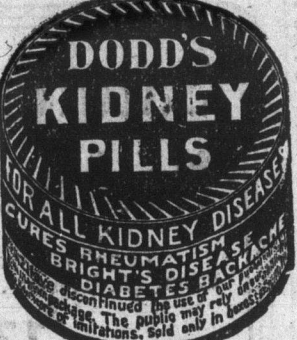

Twenty Millions Dying.

Russians are suffering all the horrors of starvation.

London, April 11.—Dr. Kannard, commissioner of the Society of Friends, who was sent to investigate the Russian famine, writing from Samara, April 3, says:

"There are 20,000,000 people distributed in the southeastern provinces of Russia, who cannot live to see another harvest without aid."

In Samara, he adds, thousands are dying, and 750,000 are starving. Of the latter, only 372,700 are getting relief, one meal in 24 hours. As a meal is only two pounds of bread and a bowl of soup, this, according to the commissioner, means dying by degrees. Even this meagre dole, in countless instances, is divided among many mouths. There are only sufficient funds on hand to last until May 1, whereas money would be needed until the end of July, when the harvest will bring relief.

The commissioner especially appeals for canned milk. He says there are 300,000 children in Samara Province who have no milk and are forced to eat coarse bread made of acorns, powdered wood and cucumbers, resulting in thousands of deaths and much disease.

In conclusion, the commissioner appeals to the Anglo-Saxons for \$2,500,000 to save "twenty millions of human beings, who are dying lingering deaths from starvation."

Satin Finish For Most Spring Materials—Sleeve Styles.

A satin finish is noticeable on nearly all the spring materials, even on the dress linings and underpetticoats. A satin finished fabric is always more effective than a dull silk and for this reason requires less trimming, which is often a decided advantage.

Judging from the present indications, the fashions this spring are more or less on the elaborate order, with the exception of the severely plain tailored costume and the plain but extremely chic shirt waist. There are ruffles, plaatings, flounces and folds of silk, satin or velvet, and lace and embroidery play an all important part on most of the gowns. Fortunately the lines of most of the styles are good and long and unbroken, so that the trimming following these lines does not seem so appallingly overdone and exaggerated.

Materials are also elaborate in design and pattern, but when figured materials are used there is not the same chance for trimming.

The sleeves of the new waists are very attractive. They follow the lines of the arm and are more becoming than the sleeves of last year. They reach, as a general thing, below the elbow and are finished with the flat unlined band of lace or with narrow ruchings or lace, silk or rows of shirtings. There is more than a suggestion of a puff about the elbow, but the trimming lies flat against it or, if put around it, somehow seems to hold it in place.

Serious Accident at Canada Foundry Man's Back Broken.

Toronto, April 11.—By the collapse of a wall at the Canada Foundry yesterday morning, Harry Carter, a bricklayer of Tiverton avenue, had his back broken; Alfred Carter, bricklayer of 24 Franklin street, was severely cut; J. Brown, a steamfitter, had his head cut and T. Sanderson, a painter, was lightly injured.

Three of the men were taken to St. Michael's Hospital, where their injuries were attended to. All but Harry Carter were able to go home, who, although in a critical condition, was resting easier last night.
