A PROPER RULE.

The Toronto Mail and Empire lays down what must be admitted to be a proper rule and one that the Whitney vernment should compel officials to live up to when it says:

"It is stated by one of the organs that a newly-appointed license inspector attended a Conservactive Association meeting at Listowel, and took part in politics. Whether the statement be true or not we do not know; but this much is certain-officials are out of politics, and the officer who participates in party work cannot retain his position. The Whitney Government did not undertake to stop partisanship in the public service in order to introduce the same evil of a different stripe. All officers will attend to their public duties exclusively or get out."

PUNISHMENT FOR PERJURY.

Perjury is one of the most rife and seldom punished crimes in Canada, This is a reflection on our judiciary, because the crime is usually committed in the presence of a constituted court. On the witness who, standing in court, will deliberately perjure himself, a rebuke from the bench has about as much effect as a severe admonition would have on a burglar caught red-handed. So lax has been the action of the courts for the punishment of perjury that it is coming to be regarded by a certain class as venial offence. There is scarcely an assize at which some conscienceless litigant or "smart-aleck" witness is not flagrantly gulty of the crimes yet they are seldom or never punished except, possibly, by a sarcastic expression of scepticism from the

During the present investigation of the plumbers' combine in Toronto this week a witness impudently perjured himself repeatedly, and after being dismissed from the box is alleged to have admitted to an officer, of the court that he had done so, but on being recalled a few minutes after, he den.ed making the admission though in terms that left little doubt as to the falsity of his statement. Also his original evidence was of a character that left no doubt, in the opinion of the court, that he was not telling the truth, and, moreover, the fact was easily susceptible of proof in a criminal prosecution by the production of evidence bearing on his statements. Yet the man was allowed to go with a reprimand which he accepted with brazen nonchalance. It is in such cases as this that the courts should take action to enforce respect for an oath among those who appear to have lost it.

AN ILL-ADVISED CONCESSION. Brantford Expositor, Lib.

Considerable of a storm has been created by the appearance of Hon. A. B. Aylesworth, the new postmaster-general, as chief counsel for the Ottawa Electric Light Company in a suit with the city of Ottawa. The defence is that when Mr. Aylesworth consented to join the Laurier Government it was upon condition that he should be permitted to continue his private practice. If so, it was a very ill-advised concession, more particularly after the adoption of a system of pensioning cabinet ministers for sacrifices they are supposed to make of their private interests while serving the country.

TURTLE ON ONE FARM 109 YEARS

A land turtle with an authenticated history of over a century lives on the old Wiest farm, in Oley Township, several mles from Boyertown. Daniel Wiest, a grandson of the first man by that name to settle in Oley, when 18 years old, found the turtle in 1796 and cut the date and his initials in its shell. After his death in the fall of that year, the inscription "1796—D. W.," was renewed from time to time by his brother John. He died in 1838 and the renewal of the inscription was then continued by his son, Daniel Wiest. His death occurred ten years ago, and regularly every summer since then the old turtle has been seen on the Wiest farm, generally in the meadow.—Philadelphia Record.
