WILLIAM GORDON

RIVER FLOODS A CITY.

Inhabitants of Campos, Near Rio Jan-

eiro, in Bad Plight.

Rio Janeiro, Feb. 9.—The Parahiba

Do Sul has broken its banks and in-

undated the lower parts of the City of

Campos, 140 miles northeast of Rio

Janeiro, to the depth of 13 feet in some

places. Many houses have collapsed,

widespread damage has been done, and

communication with Campos is impeded.

The work of rescuing the impris-

oned inhabitants of the city is most

difficult.

Campos is on the Parahiba Do Sul,

near its mouth. The city is connected

by rail with Rio Janeiro, has electric

illumination and other modern im-

provements, and a population of about

30,000 souls.

STANLEY FACES TRIAL.

Coroner's Jury Says He Murdered

Farmer Freeman Harvie.

Halifax, N. S., Feb. 9.—The coroner's

jury in the Harvie murder case re-

turned a verdict holding George Stan-

ley for the crime. The Fisher boy was

released.

The Halifax police believe that Stan-

ley was in Halifax several weeks re-

cently under the name of Ryan, and

is wanted there for the theft of \$40

from a fellow boarder. It is even sug-

gested that inquiries be made to as-

certain if he was a firebug at St. Luke's

Cathedral, which was recently burned.

Ryan on the streets always wore a

long cape over his shoulders, which

helped to give him the appearance of

a clergyman.

Cremated in His Home.

Kingsford, Feb. 9.—Yesterday morn-

ing miners back of Sydney, who had

noticed a fire about midnight, started

out to investigate the cause and were

horrified to find the home of Michael

Patterson, three miles east of Syden-

ham, burned to the ground with the

charred remains of the unfortunate

owner in the ruins. Mr. Patterson

had attended the races at Sydney

Wednesday and left there for his home

about eight o'clock. Patterson had a

sister living with him who was away

from home at the time.
