Only 12 Escape Alive. Charleston, W. Va., Feb. 9.—At least twenty-eight men are supposed to have met death in a terrible mine explosion met death in a terrible mine explosion in the Parallel mine of the Stewart Collieries Co. near Oakhill. Thirty-mins men were employed in the mine and only twelve have escaped alive. At midnight six bodies had been recovered near the mouth of the mine, and it is certain that all the others in the mine are dead.
