THE YARMOUTH LINE.—The new steamer Boston, contracted for by the Yarmouth S. S. Co., limited, to run between Yarmouth and Boston in conjunction with the steamer Yarmouth, has been completed and will sail from Glasgow for Yarmouth via Halifax, on or about Friday, August 1st. It is expected she will have considerable freight for Halifax and will bring passengers at low rates. This steamer is first class in every particular, thoroughly equipped with all the modern conveniences, has triple expansion engines and a guaranteed speed of seventeen knots. She will be placed on the route immediately on arrival.

W. & A. RAILWAY.—The Windsor & Annapolis Railway has issued a beautiful little pocket card time-table. The first page is a combination picture in gold and colors, illustrative of Nova Scotia scenery, with a W. & A. R. train, and a vignette of Evangeline. The two inside pages are given up to a time-table and other information and the fourth page has a miniature map of Western Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and New England States, showing the W. & A. R. and its rail and steamboat connections. They have also issued a handsome "folder" in colors, bearing on its first page a picture of Evangeline and a bit of scenery on the line of the railway, showing part of the Basin of Minas. The folder also contains a map, time table, fares and a quantity of information in a condensed form. On the back are miniature views of Halifax, St John and Blomidon. We are glad to see this truly picturesque line of railway being more generally made known to the pleasure-seeking public.

DEATH OF A MINISTER.—REV. J. O. Redden, Baptist minister, of Lompoc, California, died at Chicago on 23rd inst. He was a native of Windsor, N. S., and a graduate of Acadia College in the class of 1875. He was for the last five years in California, where he went for the benefit of his health. He was returning with his wife and child, to his native province, when his death took place. The funeral services were held at Windsor on 30th inst., when a sermon was preached by Rev. Messrs Langille and Morse. Mr Redden was a man of high character and his early death will be much lamented. He married Miss Laura Gourley, of Truro, at one time teacher in Acadia Seminary.
