

Very Humiliating.

One of the striking characteristics of the federal representative of this county when he was only plain Dr. Borden, M. P., was his extreme sensitiveness to newspaper criticism. In those days the zeal which he showed in defending his reputation was something admirable. Even the most harmless newspaper criticisms were invariably met with dire threats of libel suits.

In the discharge of his duties as an independent journal THE ACADIAN in days of yore was very frequently made the object of these threats by the irate doctor, and while it is true they never had any very great effect upon editorial utterances, they at least tended to convince us that, whatever others might think, our representative at least had great confidence in his own integrity and morality.

Of late this zeal seems to have vanished. If Sir Frederick Borden were these days looking for occasions for libel suits he would not have much difficulty in finding them. Scarcely an independent paper which refers to the minister of militia at all omits to make statements concerning him which if said of a respectable politician would not prove grossly libelous. The Calgary Eye-opener, the Toronto World and the Halifax Herald have all been saying "easy things to understand." No later than Wednesday of this week the Halifax Herald made certain statements in reference to that gentleman which would afford material for some very interesting libel suits, but we have heard of no action being brought. The late minister of railways has, under similar circumstances, exhibited very much more of the military spirit than has the minister of militia himself. Has Sir Frederick's more extended experience in military affairs taught him that "discretion is the better part of valor?"

Whether this is so or not it is at least very humiliating to Sir Frederick's constituents to read these ugly insinuations, these transparent hints and bold reflections upon the character of their representative, and to feel that the publication of such matter is being proved to be a perfectly safe performance.

Our bright contemporary, the Middleton Outlook, celebrated its thirtieth anniversary on Friday last. The event was marked by a change in the paper. The Outlook has been somewhat reduced in size and in connection a Tuesday issue was begun this week. The new paper is called The People, and as the name implies will be devoted to "whatever promises to advance the moral or material interests of the public." Friend Cox is rapidly supplanting the venerable editor of his enterprising little town, and is evidently enjoying a well-earned prosperity. Success to him and his venture.

The Hon. Mr. H. Cushing, minister of public works in Alberta, is in Toronto on business in connection with the installation of a government telephone system in that province, of which 500 miles has already been constructed. We quote from an interview in the Mail and Empire:—"The government is endeavoring to purchase the Bell lines in the province, but so far without success, and should the negotiations prove unavailing, parallel lines will probably be built. A number of exchanges have already been installed and government aims to give telephone connection to every part of the province."

The regular quarterly meeting of the Wolfville Board of Trade was held on Tuesday evening. Owing to various reasons the attendance was small. A number of matters were discussed, after which the meeting was adjourned until Wednesday evening, Oct. 30th, when it is hoped there will be a large and interesting meeting. An effort is being made to increase the interest in the Board, and arrange for an aggressive winter's campaign. Every citizen should rally to the support of this valuable institution.

The strike at the Springhill Mines, which has involved 1,600 men and lasted for nearly eleven weeks and has cost the men in wages more than \$500,000 was declared off on Friday by a joint meeting of the two P. W. A. lodges at Springhill, in which the miners are enrolled. They accept the award of the board of conciliation, subject to explanations made by Judge Graham, who was its chairman, on the award which they at first rejected. This decision was arrived at by secret ballot, and carried by a large majority.

Believing that there is a combine among the Canadian paper manufacturers at its annual meeting in Yarmouth last week, passed a resolution recommending the repeal of a resolution of the duty on foreign paper. Another resolution was passed urging the Dominion government to reduce the postage on newspapers to one cent per pound and terminate altogether the stamping of papers destined for the States.

Sunday-School Convention

The annual Convention of the Nova Scotia and Bermuda Sunday-school Association will be held at Windsor on October 29th, 30th, 31st. This is a gathering of very practical value to all engaged in the Sunday-schools of our province as well as to those who will soon become officers and teachers. All departments of the Sunday-school will be treated by round tables and addresses; while the reports of the various superintendents of departments will be suggestive of advance steps in the individual Sunday-schools.

All delegates attending will be granted reduced fares on the railroads on the standard certificate plan. Purchase a single first-class ticket to Windsor and secure, at the same time, from the ticket agent, a standard certificate. This, signed by the secretary of the convention, will entitle the holder to a return ticket free. When delegates cannot purchase a through ticket to Windsor, a second certificate must be obtained where the second ticket is bought. Homes will be provided for all delegates. Names of delegates desiring entertainment should be sent to Mr. James O'Brien, Windsor, not later than October 23rd.

Tuesday, October 29th, will be devoted to an institute for teachers of the primary and junior grades. Mrs. Mary Foster Bryner, international field worker, who will be present during the whole Convention, will give several addresses and will be assisted by leading Sunday-school workers from all parts of the province.

Each session of the Convention programme will be devoted to some one department of the Association, namely, adult education, temperance, international Bible-reading and home.

These departments will be treated by experienced leaders. There will also be several helpful addresses by able speakers, and the whole gathering aims to be of service to the Sunday-schools. Superintendents should all endeavor to be in attendance themselves and, besides, have their school represented by at least one delegate.

It would be a good investment for any Sunday-school to pay the expenses and send a number of their teachers to this Convention.

The Convention is open to everyone, and all are cordially invited to attend.

British Shipbuilding.

It not only costs the United States quite a third more to build the ships for her navy than it costs Great Britain to build her ships, but the ships of the United States are not nearly so well built or planned as British ships. According to the October number of the 'Navy,' the naval bureaus at Washington, and incidentally, the entire department, are responsible for the recent fatal disasters on the 'Missouri' and 'Georgia.' The 'Navy' asserts that sea-going officers again and again have remonstrated against the unsatisfactory and faulty construction of tarrets, but in spite of such protests the defective methods have been continued. To these faults, it is charged, the explosions on the two vessels were due, and other like accidents are liable to happen at any time from the same cause. As the safety of the country might some day depend upon the navy, such incompetence or fraud calls for immediate and searching investigation. The 'Navy' asserts that the same errors are present in the designs of the new ships, and demands a thorough overhauling of the entire department. It would seem to be high time.

The foot-ball season was fairly opened here on Wednesday, when the defeated the Halifax Crescents by a score of 8-0. Acadia won the kick off, facing a strong north wind. After eighteen minutes, with neither side showing any particular steam, Sammy Lewis scored a try for Acadia. The try was converted by Hughes. For the rest of the half the game was all Acadia's, the ball being always in the territory of the blue and black. The first half ended 5-0, in favor of Acadia. In the second half, the Crescents had carried the ball nearly to the Acadia goal when Faulkner, cleverly eluded a Halifax player, kicked the ball well up the field. It was caught by Messenger, who made a brilliant run carrying the ball nearly over the line. The Crescents quickly regained their lost ground, and for considerable time a hot fight was waged in the centre of the field, neither side having the advantage. After several minutes of this, the Crescents carried the pig-skin well into the Acadia territory and were prevented from scoring only by Faulkner's brilliant kicking. Shortly afterwards Porter got the ball and making a spectacular run up the field nearly scored. Several minutes later Captain Kierstead scored a try for the blue and garnets. Lewis failed in the conversion. The game ended two minutes later.

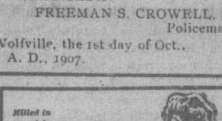
