RALEIGH IN PORT.

The H.M.S. Raleigh, flagship of the West Indian and North American squadron, arrived in port from Quebec at 11.30 a.m. yesterday.

The Raleigh, which is a first class cruiser, is flying the flag of Vice-Admiral Sir William C. Pakenham, K.C.B., K.C.M.G., K.C.V.O., Commander-in-chief, who is making a tour of inspection of the station. The training ship Briton, and the Naval Wireless Station at Mount Pearl, will be included in the inspection. The ship is one of the latest additions to the Navy, being commissioned in March last. She has a displacement of 9,750 tons, is 600 feet long, 65 feet broad, and carries a crew of 750 men. Her armament consist of seven 7.5 inch and six three anti-aircraft. She is an oil burner having engines to develop 70,000 horse power, and can make over 30 miles per hour. The Raleigh will remain here for a week, during which time a round of social events in honour of the ship's visit, will be held. On Monday night a dance will be given at Government House at which the Admiral and his officers will be present.

This afternoon an "At Home" is being held on board, for which a large number of invitations have been issued.

Vice Admiral Sir William Christopher Pakenham, who arrived by the flagship yesterday, has had a distinguished career. Joining the service 47 years ago he has been actively employed on various stations throughout the Empire, and at the beginning of the war, commanded the 3rd Cruiser Squadron, and in 1917 was appointed to the command of the Battle Cruiser Fleet, and for his work in these commands was made a K.C.V.O. and K.C.B. From 1913 he was a Lord Commissioner of the Admiralty, and in 1919 was appointed president of the Royal Military College, Greenwich.
