The animals on the ground were mostly grass fed sorubs, and the best of these were waken by Mr. Lemon, of Toronto, to complete his last lot of the season for the Old Country. Butchers' cattle are worth from 40 to 50 per lb. live weight. There were quite a few milch cows on the ground, and these were worth from \$30 upwards per head. There were no sheep marketed. A few small hogs sold at \$2.50 to \$3.00 apiece.

THE TENTH ANNUAL CELEBRATION

Large Attendance at Both Games and Concert.

The Guelph Caledonian Society stand in with the weather clerk to such a degree that many suspect that mystic individual of being a Scotchman, and if the Clansmen could only lay hands on him they would no doubt elect him an honorary member. The Society celebrated their first decade on Dominion Day and only once in their ten years existence have they had reason to complain on account of unpropitious weather. Wednesday was as fine a day for outdoor sports as could be wished for, the atmosphere being just cool enough to be pleasant while fleecy clouds protected competitors and oulcokers alike from old Sol's flerce rays. With so much in their favor and with the splendid programme offered, it is no womeer that the attendance was large, and it must be gratifying not only to the Committees but to the Society as a whole to know that although a great expense was incurred the receipts at both games and concert were close on \$500, and sufficient to ensure a handsome surplus. A new and taking feature of the celebration was the presence of the Bell Band, which at intervals during the day enlivened the proceedings with music.

The young ladies were Misses Kate and Belle Macpherson, Woodstock, and Lizzie Sinolair, Hamilton. On arrival at the grounds the games and sports were at once entered upon, opening with a Scotch reel by Masters Robbie Burns, John Rattray, F. Wilson and Calvin Sinolair.
