THE DEBT.

Our Liberal friends never tire of talking about Canada's public debt. When everything else fails, they fall back on this subject of the national debt. Every person is willing to acknowledge that it is large enough, but all fair minded persons who have given the matter any consideration must admit that Canada has ample to show for her debt. The Canadian Pacific Railway cost \$60,000,000. Where can a man be found who would rather have the money back and be without the road? This road is the pride of Canada and the admiration of the world. Canada canal system cost \$46,000,000. But it is one of the finest systems in the world. By means of canals great ocean grey hounds can go to Montreal and vessels drawing fourteen feet of water can now reach the furthest end of Lake Superior. What public spirited citizen of Canada would, if such a thing were possible, do away with this magnificent canal system in order to get back the money expended in the construction? Canada's debt is \$60 per head while that of the other colonies is as follows: Cape of Good Hope, \$77 per head; New South Wales, \$214; South Australia, \$281; Western Australia, \$150; New Zealand, 298; Queensland, \$323; Natal, \$45; Newfoundland, \$65. The debt of Great Britain, which practically rules the trade and commerce of the world, and of which we are all proud to belong, is \$84 per head.—Chignecto Post.

Key West, Fla., June 8.—It has been

learned here on good authority that Macco has an army of 20,000 men and that they are strongly fortified in the mountains of Timor Del Rio, the Spaniards having utterly failed to drive them from their stronghold. Macco has eight cannon, two of which were captured from the Trochis on his recent attack, when it was reported that he was repulsed. The report that Macco has our companies of women soldiers has been confirmed. The Cuban women have such a dread of Spanish brutality that many of them have fled to the battlefield beside their husbands and brothers than to be thrown into the forts at the Spaniards' mercy. In Macco's recent attack on the Trochis three Amazons took part and fought fiercely, using machetes on the Spaniards. The attack was made north of San Marcos and General Bermudez crossed into Havana Province with 1,500 men.
