Montreal is now threatening New York's grain trade. Such changes are inevitable. Northward the star of empire takes its way.

It is only a small matter, the granting of a bonus of five thousand dollars, but every citizen should take enough interest in the welfare of the town to deposit his ballot today.

The Presbyterian church in Canada does not seem to have felt the effects of hard times. An increase of \$248,000 in contributions shows that the members of the church realize their duty in these days of national development.

Miss M. Clara Dow, whose home is in Cleveland, Ohio, is the proprietress of nine drug stores. She began her business training when she was 12, was graduated as a pharmacist when she was 18 and now employs 132 persons in her drug business.

A new method of resuscitation of the apparently drowned, has been adopted by the British Royal Life Saving Society. The patient is laid face downward and natural breathing is encouraged by gentle and regular pressure on the lower ribs at the rate of about fifteen times per minute.

The citizens of Campbellton have a duty to perform today, a duty which all should attend to.

This is the day set on which a vote will be taken on the question of granting a bonus of five thousand dollars to Messrs. J. & D. A. Harquail and it is hoped a fair vote of the ratepayers will be polled.

In a recent issue we went fully into this matter, and with reference to this matter, every citizen will go to the poll and vote on the question at issue.

MONTREAL IS AHEAD.

The New York Produce Exchange has been alert in realizing the results of Montreal's successful competition for Atlantic shipping business. The White Star Line has withdrawn five grain and freight carrying vessels from the New York and Liverpool route, and the rapid shifting of traffic is shown by the record of 8,000,000 bushels of grain from Montreal since the opening of St. Lawrence navigation this season as compared with 2,000,000 bushels from New York.

The grain rate from Duluth and Port William to Montreal at 4.25 cents a bushel. This is for the all-water route and includes extra insurance. From Montreal it is 2.75 cents per bushel. These rates are contrasted with 7.40 cents per bushel from these ports to New York by way of Buffalo. From Georgian Bay the rates are said to be 4.75 cents per bushel by water and rail to Montreal, this also leaving a substantial advantage in favor of the Canadian port.

With all these advantages and with a shorter Atlantic route Montreal is the natural port of shipment and is eagerly adopted by the steamship suggested many devices for bringing the trade back, but nothing will succeed except a reduction in the cost of hauling. It will be necessary to continue the efforts which have resulted in this improvement in our export trade. Our competitors are already active in seeking better railway rates to New York. The railways can do much to throw the balance of advantage in favor of any port, but they cannot ignore distances. The improvement of the Erie Canal will greatly favor the southern port, but we have in prospect an enlarged Welland Canal with proportionate improvement in the navigation facilities on the upper St. Lawrence. In this healthy rivalry we have the advantage of the better situation and the shorter route, and this is destined to outweigh the benefit of an established course of trade. Having already the advantage of cheapness in reaching Montreal, we must supplement it by lowering in every way the cost of shipping from this leading Canadian port. The Harbor Board have done much and can do more in this regard. The Government can continue its policy of perfecting aids to navigation and making the St. Lawrence route as safe as that

from any Atlantic port. With the growth of trade the disabilities of occasional congestion with high rates will disappear and the grain exchange will so expand as to fully justify the sales at the port and the famous with purchase in the West. Surely the sense, optimism and enterprise of the Ottawa Government will not permit it to neglect results of this kind.

WISDOM FOR WOMEN

GRAHAM BREAD.—Dissolve one-half cake of yeast in a pint of lukewarm water, add a pinch of salt, and enough wheat flour to make a batter like cake. Set it to rise and when light add a tablespoonful of sugar and one of shortening, then enough Graham flour to make it fit to be kneaded into a loaf. Put in a little baking powder and let it rise again. When light, bake in a slow oven about half to three quarters of an hour, according to size of loaf.

ALMOND TORTE.—Half pound almonds, half pound sugar, half pound flour, yolks of six eggs, two teaspoons cinnamon and cloves, two teaspoons vanilla, chop almonds fine, then beat together butter and sugar, add yolks, then flour, almonds and spices. Bake in jelly tins in a slow oven for an hour. Put jelly between layers. The cake is better if made two days before serving.

SCRAPPLE.—Boil a cleaned pig's head until the flesh slips easily from the bones, remove these and chop the head fine. When the liquor in which the head was boiled is cold take the fat from the top, return the liquor to the fire and when it boils put in the chopped meat, well seasoned with salt and pepper. Boil up and stir in cornmeal, a little at a time, and bring to the thickness of mush. Cook an hour, turn out to cool and cut in slices as needed.

Yellow shoes, which no girl considers herself in the latest style without, can be cleaned by putting a few drops of turpentine on a wooden rag and rubbing them evenly all over. When dry, polish with a soft brush, and they will look like new.

Burning oil is spread by water. To extinguish it throw down flour, sand or earth. The idea is to prevent the oil spreading.

POTATO SALAD.—Twelve cold boiled potatoes cut in dice add a stalk celery cut in small pieces, a small raw onion, chopped fine. Make dressing of two tablespoonfuls vinegar, one egg, one tablespoon flour, one-half teaspoon salt, one-half teaspoon ground mustard. Let come to a boil, then add one pint sour cream, pour the dressing over it and mix thoroughly. Line a lettuce with lettuce leaves, fill in with salad, garnish with cold boiled eggs cut in slices.

BOHEMIAN BUTTER CAKE.—Dissolve one cake dry yeast in one cup of lukewarm milk, and one and one-half cups flour, one-half teaspoon salt and beat to a smooth batter. Let a little rest. Cream together one-half cup butter (lard or butterine will do for the economically minded) one half cup of sugar, two eggs and the grated rind of a lemon. Add this to the sponge and enough flour to make a soft dough. Let rise again to double its size, divide into three parts—handle as little as possible. Put each part in a buttered pan and let rise again to double its size. Pour over each two tablespoonfuls melted butter sprinkle with three tablespoonfuls of sugar and a little cinnamon. Bake twenty-five minutes.

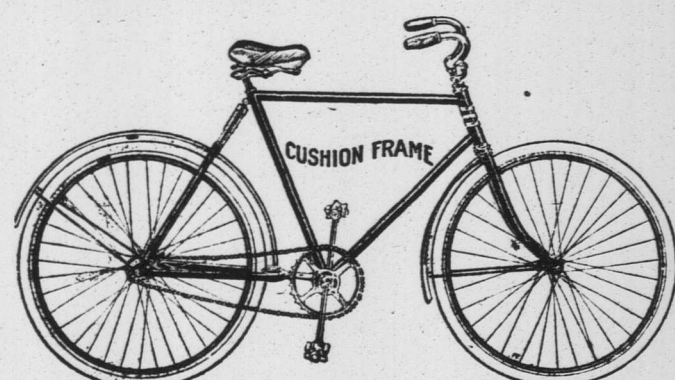

HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

MINUTES OF THE LAND AGENCY

WEST

Any even numbered section of Dominion lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 25, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres more or less.

Application for entry must be made in person by the applicant at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district in which the land is situated. Entry by proxy may, however, be made at an Agency on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, brother, daughter or sister of an intending homesteader.

The homesteader is required to perform the homestead duties upon one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) A homesteader may, if he so desire, perform the required residence duties by living on farm land solely owned by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead. Joint ownership in land will not meet this requirement.

(3) If the father (or mother if the father is deceased) of a homesteader has permanent residence on a farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of the homestead, or upon a homestead erected for him in the vicinity, such homesteader may perform his own residence duties by living with the father (or mother).

(4) The term "vicinity" in the two preceding paragraphs is defined as meaning not more than nine miles in a direct line, exclusive of the width of road allowances crossed in the measurement.

(5) A homesteader intending to perform his residence duties in accordance with the above while living with parents or on farming land owned by himself must notify the agent for the district of such intention.

Six months' notice in writing must be given to the Commissioner of Dominion lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.
