Death of George R. MacLeod at Cleveland. Mr. George R. He was a member of Knox Church, an earnest worker in the Young People's Society when living here. Interment will take place at Lucknow.

GEMS STOLEN.

Persian Consul at New York Lose \$3,000 Worth. New York, March 30.—Three thousand dollars worth of gems and jewelry were stolen from the show window of the store of Dikran Kelekian, Persian Consul at New York, at 275 Fifth Avenue. The jewelry was left in a tray in the window over Sunday and when the store was opened to-day it was found that a burglar had broken the glass of a small window at the side of the main display window and taken every thing the tray contained. Although the store is located across the street from the Holland House, the burglar escaped detection.

Welland, Ont., March 30.—John and Frank Druzes, Poles and brothers, are under arrest here charged with having on Saturday night waylaid and beaten and stabbed another Pole named Druzensky. Another man was concerned in the affair, but he escaped and is believed to be now in Buffalo. Druzensky, who has a dirt wound in the face, is under a doctor's care and if blood poisoning does not set in will recover.

DENIED BY R. & O.

They Have Not Sold the Hamilton Line. Montreal, March 30.—The Richelieu & Ontario Navigation Company management deny most emphatically the tale that they have sold their Hamilton line. "We have," said General Manager Smith, "had under consideration the re-organization and possible sale of the Hamilton line, but we have no dealings with the promoters of the Hamilton merger, and so far as our service to the Bay of Quinte, Toronto and Hamilton is concerned, it will be maintained by us the coming season."

Ottawa, Ont., March 30.—His Excellency Earl Grey has extended his patronage to the festivals of Cathedral music to be supplied by the church choristers throughout the Dominion under the conductorship of Sir Fred. Bridge, of Westminster Abbey. The celebrated Abbey organist leaves England for Canada, April 19th.

Last outstanding Clearing-house loan certificates wiped out to-day. Passage of proposed Mail Subsidy Bill would increase Pacific Mail's earnings \$300,000 a year. Dun's Review says in leading industries there is evidence of a gradual increase in contracts.

Boston reports tangible improvement in Copper Markets and better enquiries than for twelve months.

Bradstreet's says trade in the primary branches is quiet, and operations in industrial lines are below normal. Eleven roads for February show average net decrease of 33.83 per cent, and for eight months 10.17 per cent. Town Topics: Those who sell long stock on big news will be able to repurchase at advantage in April, and meantime traders should take the short side of the active leaders on all sharp advances.

Failures Last Week.

March 28.—Commercial failures this week in the United States, as reported by R. G. Dun & Co., are 342, against 323 last week, 322 the preceding week and 220 the corresponding week last year. Failures in Canada number 25, against 36 last week, 42 the preceding week, and 22 last year. Of failures this week in the United States, 145 were in the east, 91 south, 70 west, and 36 in the Pacific States, and 122 report liabilities of \$5,000 or more, against 123 last week. Liabilities of commercial failures this far reported for March are \$16,440,457, against \$6,631,011 for the same period the previous year.

Stocks and Bonds

New York, March 30.—The market during the morning was held fairly steady by manipulation, and London buying of Northern Pacific, but offerings in various stocks were of influential character under cover of this species of strength. Moderate buying in demand was encouraged on recessions, and London was a light buyer. The uncertainty of affairs of Erie, which will be taken up this afternoon, and report that the Great Northern has ordered closing of a number of stations on the main line, weaker copper metal prices, were the cause of the break. Stocks of

this class have been steadily selling for profits, with sales by strong interests, but we feel that prices advanced rather more rapidly than warranted by the improvement in general business. Taking the situation as a whole, we feel that the better class stocks were fairly well taken up.—Finnis & Stoppani.
