

Through the kindness of Mr. Howe, Postmaster, of St. John, according to the request of the Merchants of Summerside, a Mail for that place is now made up twice a week in St. John. Heretofore the Summerside letters went to Charlottetown and then back again. A Mail Bag, for St. John, is also made up in Summerside.

Two Schooners arrived at Summerside, from Montreal, with Goods of Canadian manufacture of superior quality, and purchased at about 50 per cent cheaper than in Boston or New York—they comprise flour, tobacco, sole leather, brooms, buckets, nails, spades and shovels, soap, candles, snuff, &c., &c. The Schooners take potatoes for a return freight. Under Confederation, nearly one third of the goods needed for the Island would come free of duty, and sold to the farmers about 20 per cent less than sold at present.—14.

The Islander of yesterday, anxious to forward the "great scheme" in a quiet way, mentions the importation to Summerside from Canada of two caravans of goods, consisting of Flour, Tobacco, Sole Leather, Brooms, Baskets, Nails, Spades, Shovels, Soap, Candles, Snuff, &c., &c., and states that if we had Confederation all these articles would come into our market free of duty, and be sold to the farmers about 20 per cent less than sold at present. In this respect we believe intercolonial free trade would be a benefit to Confederation. Some of the articles named by the Islander are now, and have been for years, imported from Canada duty free, but have been sold 35 per cent cheaper than similar ones imported from the United States? In order to settle the question of comparative cheapness, will the Islander tell his readers whether a man can live on a smaller income in Canada than he can in France or England? That's the test.—17.

It gives us great pleasure to learn that the Rev. George W. Hodgson, A. M., Fellow of King's College, Windsor, who was ordained at Dartmouth, on the 11th inst., by the Bishop of Nova Scotia, has, in consequence of the falling health of his father, Dr. Metcalfe, been appointed one of the professional staff of that institution. The classical department is assigned to the Rev. Mr. Hodgson, who will, in connection therewith, take charge of the Parish of Falmouth. After his ordination he was elected a Fellow of his Alma Mater. Having been engaged therein as acting Professor for the past four or five months, the present appointment is a gratifying proof of the fidelity and zeal with which the Rev. gentleman discharged his duties during that time. He had, we understand, a choice of two good Parishes, but he considered it his duty to connect himself with the College.—17.

The Cricket season has fairly commenced with the members of the Charlottetown Club. Busy employed till a week or two ago in fencing and laying off their new "fields," they have as yet been able only to play two games. The Juniors are now preparing to meet the Victuallers, who have invited them over to Nova Scotia. On Wednesday last the usual match between the married and single came off. Owing to the lateness of commencing, it was agreed that they should have time to play out the second, the match would be decided by the first innings. The wickets were drawn precisely at 6 o'clock, and the result was a score of 147 for the single men to 56 for the married.

The steamer "Commerce" arrived here last evening, and the steamer "Island City" to-day. The latter also runs for the firm of Messrs. Franklin Snow & Co., and is intended to ply between Charlottetown and several Ports on the New Brunswick shore, to connect with their Boston & Colonial Line, at this City. The "Island City" is a very neat little passenger boat, and seems well calculated for the intended service. If P. E. Island does not prosper now, it is not for the want of steam communication.—17.

We are pleased to learn that the Savings Bank is in a highly flourishing condition. The amount at the disposal and bearing interest is upwards of 4,000. We understand that, during the last few weeks, the deposit on Banking days averaged about £100 per day. This speaks well for the industry and frugality of our farmers, &c., and looks as if some of them, at least, are preparing to buy their farms under the Loan Bill of last Session.—17.
