The Rambles of Our Correspondent.

QUEBEC.

In close proximity to the Station of the North Shore Railroad, I noticed an insignificant building of yellow brick crowned by a turnip-shaped cupola having a diameter of from twenty-five to thirty feet. The thing was mounted by a dingy-looking wooden ball, in the centre of which stuck a great rusty iron spike, the whole affair a disgrace to the city of Quebec. This building called Saint Paul's Market, was without the walls, the others of which I have spoken were within them.

Having been pleased with the appearance of the old Church and University, I determined to visit them, which I did in the afternoon. Not having a friend at hand to guide me, I chose one from among the carriage drivers who stand about the St. Louis Hotel, and following him as implicitly as once the great Florentine did the Mantuan bard, we entered the doors of the venerable Basilica of Quebec.

The front of this building darkened by the lapse of passing years, was of the same olden architecture as that of the old churches of South America. Immediately inside the door was a box with the inscription, "pour les pauvres": into this I dropped a small sum.

Round the walls of the church were a number of paintings, which there is on my part neither time nor ability to describe. Over the high altar stood the Crown of France, of large proportions and richly gilt, the days of old, and everything in the old building, with few exceptions, was probably the same as when Montcalm made his last public prayer before fighting his last battle. From the Basilica we went to the Seminary of Quebec. We were here met by a porter who allowed us to enter the chapel of the institution, which was also surrounded by paintings; many, I presume, copies from "Johns" selling them ruin the trade. We all remember when a certain Jew opened a boot and shoe store up town. He undersold all others in the trade, till like Sampson he brought distraction on himself and ruin (nigh) on his enemies. So, too, with some of the "cheap Johns" representing Canadian concerns here. They go out and undersell respectable manufacturers and all the country with the paper of the poor farmer who is delighted at two years to pay for his mowing machine. By that time though the worthless traver will be battered and broken up, and the farmer will be no more able to pay than when he made the purchase. Respectable firms will have suffered, as surely as the shoddy ones; will go by the board.

Telegraphic News.

QUEBEC.

QUEBEC, June 28.

Friday evening a grand convention was held in the hall of Laval University. About two thousand were present, comprising the elite of the city and heads of all the societies and delegations. Hon. P. A. Landry was the second speaker. He gave an interesting outline of Acadia history, and the present status and prospects of Acadia. The warm reception given his remarks was very flattering.

Yesterday (Sunday) afternoon there was a procession and demonstration in honor of De Salaberry. About five thousand people with bands and military, marched out to Beauport and unveiled his statue, followed by illuminations and fireworks in the evening.

BRADLAUGH. The Cabinet to Support Labouchere's Motion. LONDON, June 28.—The *Standard* says:—"We understand that after a somewhat excited meeting of the Cabinet a resolution was adopted to support Mr. Labouchere's motion to rescind the vote of the House regarding Sunday. The motion will not formally be made a question of confidence, but many Liberals who voted in the majority on the last occasion will abstain from voting.

Mr. Bradlaugh addressed 10,000 persons on Northampton Saturday, and after his speech an unanimous vote of confidence was passed. He also addressed a large meeting in London on Sunday. Various other meetings have been held in London and elsewhere in his favor.

Killed by Hot Weather. NEW YORK, June 28.—The thermometer to-day reached 94 in the shade. About 30 deaths are reported from the excessive heat, mostly small children. There were 12 sun-strokes yesterday, 6 fatal.

There were 46 deaths from yellow fever in this city last week.
