Going Back to the Front

Major Jack Mersereau, who since his return from the front has been resting quietly in the seclusion of his former home at Doaktown, is making substantial progress towards recovery. Major Mersereau was wounded while serving in Flanders and was left for dead on the field. He was for a time deprived of his eyesight and also the power of his speech. He has not been much in the limelight since his return home but is counting on the day when he will be well enough to get back to the front. He hopes to be well enough to leave early in the new year.

Defeat of Cabinet

Causes Sensation

The Fall of Zaimis Cabinet Likely to Hasten Greece and Roumania into War.

London, Nov. 4.—The defeat of the Greek Government in the Chamber of Deputies and the consequent resignation of the Zaimis Cabinet, is the latest sensation afforded by the Balkans.

While, of course, it was understood that Eleutherios Venizelos, the former Premier, had it in his power to turn the Government out whenever he so desired, having the majority in the Chamber at his back, the fall of Zaimis was unexpected, as it was believed that the leader of the majority had decided to accord the Premier sufficient support to enable him to remain in office, for the present at least. As so often happens, however, a vote of confidence was demanded by the Government on a matter of minor importance—a matter of difference of opinion between M. Venizelos and the Minister of War General Yanakitsas, on military proposals—and the Government was defeated by a vote of 147 to 114.

By handing the resignation of his Cabinet to King Constantine, M. Zaimis again places on the King the responsibility of deciding the future policy of his country. In London the first impression was that the defeat of the Government would mean the immediate call of M. Venizelos and the fulfilment of the original agreement between him and the Allied Powers, to go to the assistance of Serbia. In this belief the news caused a distinct rally on the stock exchange. Later despatches from Athens, however, indicated a possible dissolution of Parliament. Should this course be taken it would be at least two months before an election would be held, and a new Chamber meet in Athens. In the meantime, either the Zaimis Cabinet, the resignation of which has not yet been accepted, with perhaps a change in the Ministry of War, or some other Cabinet favoring the King's policy of neutrality, would have charge of affairs, and consequently there would be no change in the military situation.

Even should M. Venizelos be called upon to form a new Government, it is not certain that he would join the Allies at present, but the Quadruple Entente would have the assurance that Greece would not turn against them.

From an unofficial source it is also reported that the Russians are advancing in strong force, and have captured important positions near Czernowitz—a movement calculated more than anything else to influence Roumania.

The Serbians, who are making a stand in the south, where they are supported by the British and French continue their retirement before the Austro-Germans and Bulgarians in the north and northwest. The Bulgarians are within ten miles of Nish and are advancing northeastward from Uskup toward Presnava. Thus, besides being in danger of losing their capital, the Serbians are threatened with being cut off from the south, and will only have one line of retreat to Montenegro. They are fighting severe rear-guard actions, nevertheless, and are leaving little or nothing behind for the invaders.

The fighting continues in the Champagne district of France, with the fortunes of war fluctuating.

Standardizing Canadian Eggs

From present indications it would appear that one of the most important developments to date in the improvement of the Canadian Egg Trade was the action taken by the Canadian Produce Association last winter in adopting definite standards for Canadian Eggs.

Hitherto each market and in fact each dealer had a system of grading peculiar to his own trade. This resulted in endless confusion to the consumer and great difficulty was experienced at times on the part of the producer in finding a satisfactory market for his product.

Realizing the importance of having definite standards for all live stock products the Live Stock Branch of the Dominion Department of Agriculture has endeavored by means of pamphlets, placards and other means to give the standards for eggs as much publicity as possible. The co-operation of exhibition associations has also been secured, prominent among which has been that of the Canadian National Exhibition Association at whose exhibition in Toronto this year in response to prizes offered, probably the largest collection of eggs ever brought together in one exhibition of the American Continent was displayed. Some 7,000 dozen in all were on exhibition. The prize list for eggs was prepared in accordance with the standards and the judges made their awards according to the accuracy of the interpretation, on the part of the exhibitor, of the definitions of the various grades.

At a number of exhibitions where descriptive classes for eggs have been offered, the Live Stock Branch has made a display of eggs graded in accordance with the standards and in each instance has supplemented the display with actual demonstrations, in a candling booth specially designed for the purpose, of the way in which eggs of the various grades appear when candled.

In order that the consumers and producers generally may become more familiar with the various classes and grades the following explanations is given.

Three general classes for eggs are provided under the standards viz:

"Fresh gathered," "Storage," and "Cracked and Dirty." Four grades are provided in the first class, three in the second, and two in the third.

The grades in the "Fresh Gathered" Class are "Specials," "Extras," "No. 1's" and "No. 2's." The grade "Specials" is omitted from the "Storage" class, and both specials and extras from the class for "Cracked and Dirty's."

"Specials" according to the standards are eggs of uniform size weighing over 24 ounces to the dozen or over 45 pounds net to the 30 dozen case; absolutely clear, strong and sound in shell; air cell small, not over 3/16 of an inch in depth; white of egg firm and clear and yolk clearly visible; free from blood clots.

"Extras" are eggs of good size, weighing at least 24 ounces to the dozen or 45 pounds net to the 30 dozen case; clean, sound in shell; air cell less than 3/16 of an inch in depth; white of egg firm and clear and yolk clearly visible; free from blood clots.

"No. 1's" are eggs weighing at least 23 ounces to the dozen or 43 pounds net to the 30 dozen case; clean, sound in shell; air cell less than 1/2 inch in depth; white of egg reasonably firm; yolk visible but mobile, not stuck to the shell or seriously out of place.

"No. 2's" are eggs clean, sound in shell; may contain weak watery eggs, and eggs with heavy yolks, and all other eggs sound in shell and fit for food.

Consumers in order to protect themselves in the matter of purchasing eggs should acquaint themselves with these standards and the above definitions of the grades. Only by such a demand for certain grades of eggs will the supply be forthcoming, and the demand can come only with a thorough knowledge on the part of the consumer as to what constitutes the various grades. It has also been frequently suggested that since the adoption of the standards consumers generally, in order to safeguard themselves, would do well to insist that all eggs as offered for sale be labelled in accordance with their proper grade.

Producers too, would do well to more systematically grade their eggs before marketing, and knowing definitely what they have in hand thereby in a better position to demand a price commensurate with the quality supplied.


