WATERFORD, Ireland, July 13. — A number of citizens, after celebrating the 12th got inte a drunken row with the soldiers of the Welsh regiment stationed

SCHOOL REPORT. - The following is here last night, during which the latter bayoneted to death one of the former. e commotion attracted crowds of men to the scene. When the civilians realized that one of their number had been killed they became furious, and fell upon the soldiers with such force that the latter were compelled to beat a hasty retreat to their barracks. The mob followed them up, but being threatened with powder and ball if they attempted an entrance into the barracks they con-ton.

tented themselves with smashing the windows with stones. The rage of the populace was so great this morning that it was deemed best to transfer the Welsh

regiment to some other place. This was done immediately, and as the soldiers chased by Alex. McLeod. Chas. marched from the barracks to the rail- Morris's of the Shoe Flies, of Garbraid, way station, surrounded by policemen, a mob followed, hooting and stoning them. Several Parnellites, members of parlia-ment, have telegraphed that they will bring the matter before the government and demand an immediate inquiry into the outrage. spot. The tragedy infuriated the peo-ple, and they fell with such ferocity upon the troops that the latter retreated to the barracks. The barracks were beseiged all night by citizens, who, although they were unable to break in, smashed every window in the buildings. The excitement in the city lasted all night and every soldier seen on the streets was attacked. Some straggling soldiers were stoned, beaten and kicked until unconscious. Those who escaped mob violence did it by fleeing to the barracks or the police statious for refuge. Two privates were arrested this morning on suspicion of being guilty of Grant's murder. A number of civilians profess to be able to identify the soldier who killed Grant. The excitement remains well unabated.




