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TRIED OUT MONOPLANE ON ALBERTA PRAIRIE

Aviator Brierot Said to Have Tested Machine on Ranch of His Brothers Near Didsbury—Then Went to France and Achieved Fame.

Calgary, Oct. 7.—That the first of the Brierot monoplanes, the inventor of which was the first man to cross the English channel from France to England in his flying machine, was quietly tested and tried out on a large piece of Alberta prairie, fifty miles west of Didsbury, on the morning of Oct. 7.

Andre Brierot is the man who invented his monoplane and made it such a successful flying machine, and at the time of its first trial he was with his two brothers on their ranch near Didsbury. According to the story told by several Didsbury men, he had been working quietly on his machine for some time, and immediately he found he was successful, he took his plans and went to France to see that Brierot is a Frenchman has his two brothers are still on the ranch near Didsbury. They are reputed to be well off and one of them is French count. They began ranching on home-stands and pre-emptions, sixty miles west of Didsbury, some six years ago, and are frequent visitors to Calgary. It is the intention of Andre Brierot to establish a factory for the construction of his machines in Canada and Montreal has been picked as the headquarters in Canada. He reached there a few days ago and will probably come west to visit his brothers in a few weeks.

It will be remembered that about one year ago paragraphs appeared in the press regarding the appearance of an effect that a mysterious flying machine or airship had been seen around Stettler and Didsbury. It was now reported that this was the Brierot monoplane, and it was the inventor trying out his machine before going to France with it.

SUFFOCATED BY FUMES

Two Portland Men Rooming Over a Paint Store Die in Fire.

Portland, Oct. 7.—Fire, which destroyed the contents of a paint store at Eleventh and Washington streets here last night, and damaged a rooming house above, suffocated to death two men. About a dozen firemen were overcome by the fumes from the burning oils and paint. The damage is \$20,000. The dead are J. Burke of Des Moines, and an unknown man. The men occupied the same room in the rooming-house and when their bodies were found they had been choked to death in bed. They were apparently killed while asleep.

Miss Edith passed through the town the past week for Grand Prairie, where she will act as a nurse. Miss Edith is located in Grand Prairie upon the recommendation of the Roman Catholic society of the Presbyterian church. Miss Edith's services will be greatly appreciated in the village.

Tenders are being called by the Sisters of Providence for the erection of a two-story frame hospital here, on their former site, on the Roman Catholic church. The building, completed, is expected to cost in the neighborhood of \$10,000 and will prove a great convenience to this district.

H. W. Sanford, of New York, ex-Governor and politician, passed through Thursday of this week on his way north to the Barren Lands, east of the Mackenzie river, to Chesterfield inlet, where supplies will await him, being taken in by the Dominion government and from there he will explore the continent westward through the Arctic ocean along the north shore, exploring the numerous bays and islands.

In search of a cattle, in the woods he got turned around and lost his bearings, and with night coming on was unable to retrace his steps. He had been attracted to the spot by the barking of his dog. The boy had wandered about 12 miles in a northerly direction and was in a pitiable condition when found. He is a cripple with but one leg, and this was in a badly swollen condition, his mind was also impaired, through the effects of his worries and from his conversation it was concluded that his mind was also temporarily affected. It is expected he will fully recover in a few days. The horse was not with him when he was found and the boy is unable to tell when the horse got away from him.

TO SETTLE SEAL DISPUTES

Correspondence Has Taken Place Between Canadian and United States Governments.

Ottawa, Oct. 7.—The initial report of the new department of external affairs has just been named concerns operations up to June 1914. Since the departure of Mr. Sanford Evans, Mayor of Winnipeg, he said, "there has been a very general and growing interest in part of the British public in Manitoba and the Western provinces and we have had many inquiries for Western securities." The visits of men like Mr. Evans who are deeply interested in the progress of their particular districts are very valuable in stimulating the interest of English financial men who are looking for investments in Western Canada. Mr. Evans gave a mine of information to London investors on the growth of the Western metropolises which has been quite a revelation to them.

In commercial circles, the coming international exhibition at Winnipeg is attracting much attention. From the editor of a manufacturing journal, who has been collecting statistics of the probable number of exhibits from the various countries, it is learned that the collection will be extremely large, eclipsing by far the magnificent British exhibitions which have been made at the Bazaar Exposition.

"English manufacturers," he said, "are beginning to wake up to the fact that the Canadian market is bound to become one of the largest in the world and I am informed that several of our biggest manufacturers intend to establish branch houses there."

HEAD CHOSEN FOR NEW NAVAL ACADEMY

Ottawa, Oct. 7.—The head of the naval academy which will be opened at Halifax in January will be B. S. Hartley, who gets the appointment on the recommendation of the British admiralty. Mr. Hartley is the instructor of sub-lieutenants in the British naval academy at Greenwich and has several years of service. The post will be filled by Commander Edward H. Martin of the Royal Navy.

The head of the academy at Halifax is being made over to a marine college to accommodate the cadets. Applications from those desirous of taking complete courses in the naval academy close on October 15.

The list of applicants is not a large one but the excellence of those who desire to enter the academy has their ambitions granted is good.

A BOY HERO RESCUES CHILDREN FROM SHACK

Brave Act of a Six-Year-Old Lad on the Fronts of North Battleford.

North Battleford, Oct. 5.—In a little shack, forty miles northwest of North Battleford, a little boy of six years played a part which has given him the right to be placed on the honor roll of boy heroes.

The mother of the little lad is in charge of the two younger children, a little girl of three, and a baby nine months old, while she is unable to get to her home, her father being absent. In some way the door of the stove fell and the shack caught fire. The boy ran to find his mother, who was unable to find her way quickly he ran back to the house. When he arrived the interior was in flames.

Without hesitating he rushed into the building and carried the baby out to safety. He then returned for his sister and succeeded in rescuing her. The building, being but a flimsy shack, was soon utterly demolished by the flames, and had it not been for the presence of mind of the little hero his brother and sister would have undoubtedly perished in the flames.

The little hero escaped injury save the scorching of his hair and eyebrows. His name has not been reported at the time of writing.

CHINAMAN SUSPECTED

San Francisco, Oct. 5.—It was decided today that George Yung, the Assamized Chinese arrested yesterday on suspicion that he was about to assassinate Prince Tai Hsin, should be held over to the Chinese authorities as a federal statute covered the attempted crime.
