## The War and Rumors of More Wars.

During the past few days there has been a considerable number of rumors of war fever or of attempts to stir up war fever in the countries of Europe which so far have been neutral. These rumors affect every country which is not now engaged in the war. Germany has accused Great Britain of an attempt to stir up a war feeling against her in Scandinavia and Denmark. A few days ago, there were press messages of unrest among a section of the Spaniards who were anxious that Spain should join with France, and that the meeting of the Spanish Parliament had been postponed in an effort to allay the feeling. The President of Portugal is reported as stating that the republic is only waiting a call from England to join her in the war. Demonstrations in favor of war against Austria have been frequent in Italy. Turkey has been threatened if she moves in favor of Germany and Austria, she will be not only cleared out of Europe but her Asiatic dominions attacked. King Constantine of Greece, is attributed the statement that, if any of the Balkan States begin war, Greece will fight on the side of Britain and France. In Roumania it is reported that there is a serious difference of opinion between King Carol, who is Hohenzollern and a sympathizer with Germany, and his ministry and people, who favor the Triple Entente. It is also reported from the capital that Russia has offered Roumania the Austrian provinces of Bukovina, which she has overrun and of Trans-

ylvania, a province of Hungary, which is practically unattacked, on condition that Roumania invaded Transylvania. Now comes the story from Austria that Bulgaria and Serbia are at war grips and that Bulgaria has invaded the territory of Serbia won from Turkey and about which a new Balkan war arose after the Turkish debacle, and that they are attacking Ishtib, a town about 40 miles inland over the frontier. This news has not been officially confirmed, and we should await confirmation of the news of any war between Serbia and Bulgaria before placing any reliance in it. The most important news from the western theatre of war is the further extension of the Allies' wing north of Lille, the recrudescence of Belgian attacks on the Germans in the parts of Belgium, to the north and northeast of Lille, at Ypres in West Flanders and at Oudenarde in East Flanders, the cutting of the railway at Thorout, roughly half way between Ostend and Courtrai, which is itself about half way between Ypres and Oudenarde. The severing of the railway line at Thorout has probably been effected by the Germans to hamper the sending of British reinforcements into these neighborhoods from Ostend. And in addition to all this is the report that the serious bombardment of Antwerp by the Germans was to commence this morning.

## Police Court.

Three men of the West End, charged with breaking into and entering the store of Thomas Wall on Water Street and taking ten dozen bottles of stout, were remanded.

The case against two seamen for assaulting a Chinaman was deferred as the defendants are on board the s.s. Prospero which is now on her way north.

Two drunks were discharged and another fined \$2 or 7 days. An old offender, charged with being drunk for the twelfth time, was fined \$5 or 14 days.

A threatening language case was postponed.

## THE STORY OF THE SUBMARINES EXPLOIT.

Special to Evening Telegram.

LONDON, To-day.

The action took place at one o'clock yesterday and was witnessed by the Dutch Coast Guards on the Dutch Island Schiermennikeog, in the North Sea, off the Province of Friesland. The weather was clear and the sea calm, and the destroyers could plainly be seen cruising before the mouth of the Enns. Suddenly observers saw a high column of water rise near the bow of the destroyer. The vessel immediately turned over and sank in three minutes. Shortly after the explosion the periscope of a submarine came above the surface of the water for a moment, but as soon as those on board of the plunger saw that their torpedo had struck its mark, the vessel was again submerged. The German cruiser and torpedo boats came quickly to the rescue of the crew of the ill-fated destroyer who could be seen swimming about in the vicinity of the disaster, or clinging to wreckage of their sunken ship. As Schiermennikeog is close to the Island of Berkum, where the Germans have a naval base and within sixty miles of Heligoland and the naval arsenal at Wilhelmshaven, the dash of the submarine is considered here a particularly daring one. The Dutch naval staff announces the sinking of the destroyer occurred seven miles off Schiermennikeog, well outside Dutch territorial waters. A despatch to Central News from Harwich, England, says that a rumor is in circulation there of the sinking of a German torpedo boat destroyer.

## IT WAS HIT OR MISS.

HARWICH, To-day.

The members of the crew of the submarine E. 9, which has arrived here are jubilant over the second successful engagement of their craft against German war vessels. One of the members of the crew said that while the sinking of a torpedo boat destroyer off the Dutch Coast, England, was more easily accomplished than was the case when E. 9 sent the German cruiser Hecla to the bottom, luck was with the submarine. We know when we left Harwich harbor, said a sailor, that it was a case of hit or miss. When we rose we saw two German destroyers travelling at a speed of about thirty knots. Our Commander was at the periscope and ordered the forward tubes fired three times. The first tube did not yield whether my missile hit. We then rose to the surface and the Commander said, "Look at her, the beggar is going down." Then we saw the German rise perpendicularly and air men rushing to her stern, and fired into the water. The submarine then was submerged again and made her way back to Harwich. I don't want to boast, but we got our torpedoes home.

## KING ALBERT INSPECTS FORTS.

LONDON, To-day.

A despatch from Ostend says that on Monday, King Albert of Belgium made a thorough inspection of the defensive works of Antwerp. He remained for 24 hours in one of the principal forts. Antwerp has issued a proclamation calling on all able-bodied men between the ages of 18 and 30 to join the army in defense of the Fatherland and above 30 years to take service with one of the various volunteer units for the duration of the war.

## BOMBARDMENT OF ANTWERP.

AMSTERDAM, To-day.

Hanselshelton learns from Antwerp that the Commander of the German forces is investing that city and announced at one o'clock on Wednesday afternoon that the bombardment would begin at three o'clock on Thursday morning unless the city surrendered. The Germans forced the crossing of the River Neth by means of their heavy artillery.

## 10,000 REFUGEES.

LONDON, To-day.

A correspondent of the Times at Rotterdam, confirms the report that there are 10,000 fugitives from Antwerp in Holland.

## MONTENEGRO VICTORY.

PARIS, To-day.

A despatch from Cottinjo says that Montenegrin detachments operating in Herzegovina inflicted heavy losses on the Austrians and occupied important strategic positions near Gatsko. After hard fighting the Montenegrins occupied Alak, Stipen and Kljajitch, taking a large number of prisoners and much ammunition. Continuing, the despatch stated that an Austrian aeroplane while seeking to observe French batteries was hit with shells and fell into the sea.

## GERMANS CROSS THE NETH.

LONDON, To-day.

The Germans succeeded in crossing the River Neth early on Tuesday, according to a Times correspondent in Antwerp. Telegraphing under date of Tuesday night: He says at 4 o'clock this morning the Germans succeeded in making good their footing on the

## north side of the River Neth.

Three during the night small detachments had got across and were driven back or wiped out. Two thousand Germans were on this side of the River, I believe by 6 o'clock this morning and since they have by all accounts been coming in numbers. Presumably Antwerp will have to submit to bombardment or perhaps to siege; two boats leave in early morning with the last of English and French Colonies and with both of Consuls Generals on board.

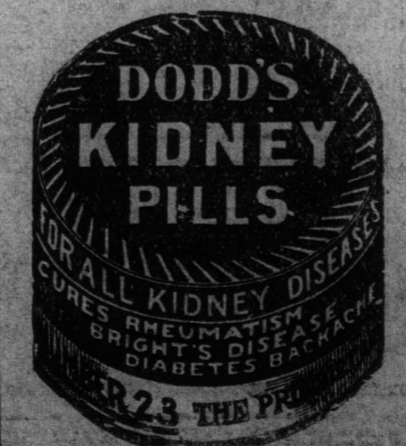
