CENTENARIAN DEAD.

VANCOUVER, B.C., Nov. 11.
Chas. Joseph Leroy, believed to have been the oldest man in Canada, died at his home in North Vancouver this morning, aged 104 years and two months. He was born at Versailles, France, and was the son of one of Napoleon's soldiers, and he himself fought with the north in the American Civil War, before settling in British Columbia.

ARMISTICE DAY IN GREAT BRITAIN.

LONDON, Nov. 11.
Great Britain to-day celebrated the first anniversary of the Armistice with impressive ceremonies. The foremost and most striking of these came in response to the appeal of King George to commemorate the event by a universal simultaneous suspension of activity throughout the country, and the observance of silence for two minutes at the moment corresponding with the signing of the Armistice, the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month. The orders for silence, and the standing at attention for two minutes, which were prescribed by the British Navy, were adopted also by all the American warships in British waters. The military arrangements were similar to those of the navy. In addition to a general suspension of industrial and commercial activities and the cessation of traffic by railroads and tramways, the celebration included solemn religious ceremonies in the churches of every denomination conspicuous among the churches, which celebrated, were St. Paul's Cathedral, Westminster Abbey and Westminster Cathedral. One large department store in London had a local clergyman to conduct service in its building, so that all the customers present might attend.
