Nfld. Ex-Official Asks for Inquiry.

EX-MINISTER OF MINES ASKS FOR DELAY UNTIL AFTER VACATION IS ONLY THE GOAT - ST. JOHN'S RUMORS SUGGEST SQUIRES IS DEEPER IN TROU-

SYDNEY, N.S., Aug. 9-(Star Spe lal)-When the political storm which wrecked the government of Sir Richard Squires broke some days ago, a hue and cry went up throughout Newfoundland asking for an explanation from Dr. Campbell, then Minister of Mines and Agriculture, in whose department, it was stated, there had occurred irregularities which led to the overthrow. The Government party press announced that Dr. Campbell had gone out of the country on vacation, to which the Opposttion replied that the present was an opportune time for him to seek rest

from the cares of office. Later Governor Allardyce forwarded a message to Dr. Campbell requesting his return, so that the charges against his department might

be investigated. Rumours were spread in the Ancient Colony, accusing Squires and his Ministers of "graft and extrava-

Dr. Campbell is now in Souris, from where he has sent the following message to Premier Warren:

"I would ask you to do me the kindness to hold a full inquiry into relief expenditure during the past two and a half years on my return from my holidays. You would recall that all relief expenditure in the different districts was conducted by me, working in conjunction with the various members from the various districts. This includes both Government and Opposition members. It was only on the member's advice that various relief works were undertaken in the different districts, and in many cases the allocations were in their hands and return sheets were not furnished the Department of Agriculture and Mines and the Public Works Department under which Department relief was conducted.

"Associated with this investigation I would ask you to investigate the various efforts at organized disturbances attempted in the Colony for political purposes during the past three years. The checkmating of these efforts was under my control, and some expenditure was incurred in my endeavor to control such disturb-

inces. "You would do me a favor if you would arrange for such a complete investigation covering the full period of relief work and extending to the final expenditure of allocations made to the various districts."

Facts Leak Out.

Travellers arriving here state that opinion is gaining force in St. John's and throughout the country that Dr. Campbell is being made the "goat" in the political mix-up.

It is whispered in the capital that the deposed Premier is much further embedded in the scandal morass than his ex-Minister, and that the promised investigation will reveal a condition of affairs not heretofore rivalled in the history of responsible Government on this side of the Atlantic.

Apparently both Government and Opposition members are sealed to silence regarding the inner facts, but enough has leaked out to warrant prediction that there has been serious mishandling of the country's funds and that the forthcoming investigation will be productive of evidence that will startle hardened political grafters wherever the story is read.

Squires is living in the strictest retirement since his downfall. He refuses to see any but his intimate friends and no word has come from him as to the part he will play in the coming inquiry. He is resourceful and pertinacious and no doubt is framing a brief that will tax the ingenuity of his enemies of the Opposition to refute.-Montreal Star.

Record Production of Paper.

The production of Canadian newsprint mills reached a new high point in the history of the industry at the beginning of this year, falling just below the 100,000 ton mark. Canadian mills may now be said to have reached a production level of 1,200,000 tons a year, as compared with an actual production during the year 1922 of 1,086,551 tons. It is reported from Vancouver that the Powell River Pulp and Paper Company is proposing to spend four million dollars on facilities for increasing the present production of newsprint, which is about 65,-000 per annum. The output of the International Paper Company's Mill at Three Rivers is now about 265 tons s day, an addition of nearly 80,000 tons to the Canadian total since the middle of last year.
