MANY STEAMERS ORUSHED OR DISABLED.

The ice-bridge began to move on Friday, with the tide. Steamers Prince Edward and Rescue have been working at it for the last four days. The former made her way to this side at one o'clock this p. m. The latter has been carried down, jammed in ice, but will probably aget clear at the mouth of the south channel.

Later—The departure of the ice-bridge has been attended with most disastrous results to the shipping wintering along the covers. Hall's piers have been carried away.
