BILLY D. AND MINNIE B. B. IMPRESSED THE SOUTHERN HORSEMEN

Calgary horses at the Lethbridge races which were held on Victoria Day did exceptionally well and Geo. Haas, the popular horseman, formerly of Calgary, carried off three second purses in the day's events.

The time in the free-for-all was very fast for so early in the season and the finishes were so close that only the judges could pick the winners. Geo. Haas, driving Billy D., owned by Fred Johnston of Calgary, came in second against Star King who has a record five seconds faster than the Calgary horse.

Fred Johnston's Minnie B.B. also driven by Haas showed up well in the 2:20 pace. This was her very first start and won the first heat in 1:10. She looks to be one of the very best green horses in the Western Canada. After the first heat Haas was content to go easier with her as she was racing with older and experienced horses. Two other Haas horses, Oro Mombells and W. H. S. showed up well in the trotting events. The latter is one of the best standard bred horses in Canada and is the show horse that in 1911 won practically every time shown in Calgary, Edmonton, Brandon, Winnipeg, Regina and Saskatoon.

Horses were entered from Calgary, Helent, Great Falls, Kallispel, Laura, and other places. The sport in the south was in fine shape and the crowd of 3,000 people in attendance testified to the popularity of the sport in the southern city.

Four teams will compose the Calgary and District Cricket League this season, but these four eleven will represent only two clubs, the Calgary Cricket Club and the St. John's Cricket Club. Each of these organizations will enter two teams of equal strength, an A team and a B team.

The annual general meeting of the club was held last night in the Y.M.C.A. when delegates from each organization were present. A communication was read from the Cochrane club stating that they would be unable to enter a team in the league this season, but they were willing to play exhibition matches during the season.

The position of the clubs in the race last year was: Calgary B first, St. John's second, Calgary A third, Hillhurst fourth, and Hillhurst fifth. A motion that any player who had not paid his dues for the past season should be ineligible to play this season was unanimously passed.

A communication from Victoria was read in which the local league was invited to send a representative team to participate in the carnival which is being held in that place between August 2 and 10. This proposition was turned down as unfeasible as the Western Canada tournament dates have been fixed for the last week in August.

Mr. T. Hill acted as secretary at the meeting in the absence of Norman Y. Plummer, who is ill at the coast. A vote was passed for Mr. Plummer for his work during the past season, as well as one to the Y.M.C.A. for the use of the building.
