LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

—The north Waterloo street school will be opened on Monday afternoon.
—Mr. Fred W. Moorehead, of this city, has gone to Chicago, where he has secured a good position.
—The Central school property and the Waterloo street south and Horton street school properties are to be sold to-day by auction.

—Miss Lottie Carson, of this city, who has been in delicate health for some time, is visiting her sister, Mrs. Jas. H. Bayne, Newbury.
—Mrs. Hyman and child and Mr. White, head, of this city, are among the saloon passengers per steamer Polynesian, leaving Quebec to-day for Liverpool.
—Miss May Field, of South London, one of the pupils of the London High School, has received a first-class certificate from the Toronto Board of Examiners.

—George Law did not appear at the Police Court this morning to press the charge against his neighbor Mrs. Henry Martin, of using abusive language. The case was consequently dismissed.
—Ald. Moule is filling the civic chair of state, in the absence of Mayor Taylor, who left to-day with the deputation which went to Toronto to interview the Attorney-General on the subject of London's sewer system.

—Canon Richardson, of this city, occupied the pulpit of Christ Church, Delaware, on Sunday evening, and preached a thanksgiving sermon. The church was beautifully decorated, and the service was very attractive.
—W. H. Wigmore and his brother Walter had their names registered on the Police Court blotter this morning against a "riding-bicycle-on-sidewalk" charge. Sentence was suspended on the former and the latter mulcted for \$1.

—Three or four months ago Wm. F. Brown, of the Central House, lost a hand-saw, a bottle of perfume and several foreign coins. He suspected John Short,

but the latter was not arrested until this morning. At the Police Court he denied the charge. The case will be heard to-morrow.

—The grand jubilee of the Ontario Indians celebrating their settlement upon their reserve 50 years ago will be held there on Friday. Among those expected to take part in the festivities are Dr. Roome, M.P., and Mr. W. Weld, of this city.

—Sarah Ann Jenkins, of Clarence street, alleged that Abram Fox threatened to tear the eyes out of her on Sept. 23, and accordingly had him before the Police Court this morning. Fox was bound over to \$200 surety to keep the peace for six months.

—Yesterday afternoon a young lad named Graves, whose parents live on Bathurst street, was bitten on the leg by a dog supposed to have been suffering from the rabies. P. C. Woolway dispatched the canine in the rear of the Thompson House a few days later.

—Thursday generally reserved at the Police Court for the airing of liquor law infractions. This morning James A. Ross admitted his first offense and was fined \$20 and costs. The hearing of the cases against Thos. S. Hollings and Valerius were adjourned by consent until Tuesday.

—William McClellan and Michael McTaggart, drunks, were discharged by the Police Magistrate this morning. George Jacobs procured liberty for \$1. Frank Bourke was accused of drunkenness and in moderate driving yesterday. The latter charge was dropped and a fine of \$5 or 20 days imposed on the former.

—In Knox vs. Knox, at Osgoode Hall, Toronto, D. Armour, for the plaintiff, moved to strike out a statement of defense for non-compliance with an order for production. W. H. Blake, for the defendant, contra. Order made dismissing the motion; defendant to have one week to make production. Costs in the cause. An order was also made on consent changing the venue from London to Waterloo.

—The following officers have been elected by the Young Women's Mission Circle of Dundas Center Church for the ensuing year: President, Mrs. McMechan (re-elected); first vice, Miss Dixon; second vice, Miss E. Yates; corresponding secretary, Miss Jarvis; recording secretary, Miss Ryan; and treasurer, Miss M. Dempsey. At the next semi-monthly meeting it will be decided as to what disposition will be made of the \$150 received during the past year.

—Robert Armitage, a married man living on Talbot street, an employee of Stevens & Burns, was arrested this morning on a charge of stealing a silver watch, valued at \$35, from Henry Duley, engineer at the old Globe works. Armitage pleaded not guilty in the Police Court. Duley said he left his watch yesterday for a few minutes, and noticed the prisoner standing in the door. When he returned Armitage was gone and also complainant's watch from the pocket of his coat, which he had taken to the Police. The case was adjourned until to-morrow.

—The bachelors' concert, conducted by the young men of Dorchester Station last evening, in the Town Hall there, in aid of the Methodist Church, was a decided success, both in attendance and the quality and variety of the programme rendered. Rev. Mr. Hazen presided and introduced the various selections, which were liberally applauded. A duet by Mrs. Burk and Miss Hazen was greatly appreciated. Mr. Jas. W. Belcher, the well-known vocalist, of this city, was in magnificent voice and captured the audience. The recitation of Mr. W. Crawford, this city, was also cleverly rendered. Prof. Villier's violin playing and the club singing by Mr. Fred. Chittick were features of the evening.

The Telegraph and the Trial.
It has been stated that the 80,000 words telegraphed by the C. P. R. Company from their Woodstock office on Monday last was the largest number ever wired from any one Canadian office in one day. The *Advertiser*, however, is informed that on the same date the G. N. W. Telegraph Company telegraphed 105,000 words of special—not including the Associated Press report of about 10,000 words, which was copied simultaneously by several offices on the Woodstock Canadian circuit.
