A Slim Meeting of His Followers in Collins' Hall.

Henry Macklin, Wm. Shore, Wilson Mc-Cready and Joseph Marks Speak to a London West Audience.

Mr. Wm. Shore, the Conservative-P. of I.-P. P. A. combination candidate of East Middlesex, held forth to empty benches in Collins' Hall, in London West, last night. The place was less than half filled after an hour's wait from 8 until 9 p.m., when the proceedings commenced. Henry Johnston was moved into the chair by a youth who received his instructions from one of the intending speakers. Those on the platform were Henry Macklin, Joseph Marks, Mr. Shore and Mr. Wilson Mc-Creadie, the Patron candidate of the riding

for the Dominion House. Mr. Shore was the first speaker. "We should be united," said he, "and not divided by party lines as we are to-day. We should unite as Protestants and work to our interests instead of dividing on old party lines. We have been divided too long and working against our own interests by these party lines. We should unite and come together, for what is good for the Grit is good for the Tory. We are divided against our own interests year after year." Mr. Shore claimed that every department under the present Government was extravagant. "You will excuse me if I touch on Mr. Mowat," said Mr. Shore, half apologetically. "We are dealing with the Ontario Government now, but when we get up on a Dominion election we will show up the other Government, too." Mr. Shore took up a book of public accounts, assuring his hearers that "facts what we find here is facts." When he touched upon the asylum laundry bill someone in the audience asked him if the amount was not spent in permanent laundry machinery. Mr. Shore did not know, but he reassured his listeners that his figures

were absolute facts, anyway. Further on he said: "We are knuckling down to everything and sacrificing principle -and Protestant principle at that (tearfully). I claim that we have not got a thorough Protestant school in the Dominion. Whither are we drifting?"

A Voice-What is the matter with London West schools? Mr. Shore-I claim that the school books are drifting away to Popery and to Rome as fast as possible. (Hisses.) Then Mr. Shore opened a Third Reader

and turned to a poem entitled "Angels' Whispers." He said of course it was a very nice poem, but listen: "A baby was sleeping, its mother was weep-Its father was far on the far distant sea."

Several stanzas of a similar strain fol-

lowed, and then Mr. Shore lowered his voice as he came to 'Her beads while she numbered, her baby still slumbered." "There," said Mr. Shore, "that is called a Protestant Third Reader." Continuing, he picked up the Scripture lessons compiled

by the Minister of Education called by some the "Ross Bible." He said that he would read to them portions of the Old Testament Scripture that were eliminated. A Voice-Let us pray first. (Laughter.) Continuing in his Third Reader voice, Mr. Shore came to a passage, "He was led

like a lamb to the slaughter."

A Voice-That's just like Mr. Shore. Mr. Shore closed his Bible reading and address with his oft repeated question, "Whither are we drifting." If Mr. Shore is a P. of I. or a Tory he failed to make it known. Mr. McCreadie followed, and supplied

the P. of I. part of Mr. Shore's address.

He received a better hearing, and was more at home on the platform than Mr. Shore. Mr. Joseph Marks followed. "I intend to enthuse no man's prejudice," said he. "to arouse no man's passions, and I will talk about no man's religion or church. I recognize that as workingmen, if we ever want to attain our object we have got to get together on the same line and remember when we get together we are work. ing for an object and don't know what a man's religion is. I stand here to-night because Mr. Shore is pledged as an independent in an independent movement, and I stand upon the platform on no other ground." Continuing Mr. Marks said that he had faults to find with both Mr. Mowat and Mr. Meredith's stands, and he also believed the P. of I were going to hold the balance

of power after the next election. Mr. Marks spoke in the interests of labor and said: "The man who grumbles for four years of Parliament against wrong conditions and then on election day goes and votes for those wrong conditions-that man's a fool." (Applause.) In conclusion Mr. Marks criticised the platforms of both Mr. Meredith and Mr. Mowat, and said neither were to be trusted. He asked the workingmen to rise in their might and legislate in their own interests.

Mr. Henry Mackl n followed and spoke along the same lines as he did at the last

meeting in the hall a week or so ago.
