Resolutions Passed by the Association

—The Grocers Commended.

A largely-attended meeting of the  
Early Closing Association was held  
yesterday in the Y. M. C. A. rooms,  
at which representatives of the Min-  
isterial Association, W. C. T. U.,  
Trades and Labor Council, and other  
bodies interested in the movement  
were present. The following resolution  
carried unanimously:

"Resolved, that having heard of the  
action taken by the Grocers' Associa-  
tion, deciding from the first of April  
next, to close their shops not later  
than 10 o'clock on Saturday evenings,  
and not later than 7 o'clock on other  
week evenings, we the members of the  
Early Closing Association, place on  
record our gratification and hearty  
approval of this resolution, and in  
this action pledge to the grocers our  
unanimous support.

"That we respectfully and earnestly  
urge upon those who are engaged in  
other lines of business the great de-  
sirability of their joining in this move-  
ment and co-operating to make it a  
success. We submit that such a re-  
form will not only be a great boon to  
business people, but will promote that  
order and morality for which this city  
is already distinguished.

"That we further strongly appeal to  
all employers of labor in the city to  
aid in this effort by paying their em-  
ployees on some other day of the week  
than Saturday. Finally, that we most  
urgently appeal to the citizens gen-  
erally to co-operate in this movement,  
by making their purchases as early  
in the day as possible, more especially  
on Saturdays. We feel confident of the  
sympathy and support of at least a  
large majority of the citizens, when it  
is considered that this reform will  
affect the Sunday rest of hundreds of  
working people."

**REDUCED TO RUINS.**

Fire in Halifax Causes a Loss of

\$150,000 to \$200,000.

**Big Blaze in a Minneapolis Elevator—**

Loss \$750,000.

Halifax, N. S., March 3.—Fire broke  
out shortly after midnight in Gordon &  
Keith's wholesale and retail house  
furnishing establishment, one of the  
largest in Canada, and the building  
was in flames in less than fifteen min-  
utes. The stock of Le Bon Marché,  
one of the leading millinery houses,  
was damaged considerably, but the  
building was not touched. Before 3  
o'clock Sunday morning the fire was  
under control. It is estimated the ag-  
gregate loss will be between \$150,000  
and \$200,000, the loss of the Gordon &  
Keith's establishment being more than  
all the minor losses combined. Mrs.  
O'Connor, milliner, suffered consid-  
erable loss, but carried \$7,000 insurance.  
Gordon & Keith's stock was insured  
for \$67,000, and the building for \$30,-  
000, but they place their loss at about  
\$25,000 over the total insurance, which  
was all in English and American com-  
panies, except \$5,000 in the Quebec.  
Minneapolis, Minn., March 3.—Elev-  
ator "A2" owned by the Minneapolis  
Terminal Elevator Company, operat-  
ed by G. W. Van Dusen & Co. There  
were 5,657,000 bushels of wheat in  
the building, mostly No. 1 northern,  
worth about \$600,000. The spouts  
were opened and a great quantity ran  
out on the ground, so that a salvage  
of about 10 cents a bushel is probable.  
The building loss is \$250,000, making  
the total loss in the neighborhood of  
\$750,000. There is ample insurance
