ROBERT BONNER'S OFFER.

NEW YORK, Oct. 11.—Robert Bonner has written the following letter for publication: "One year ago, in discussing the question of the two-minute trotter, I took the conservative view and stated in a published letter to Gen. Tracy that I offered to give \$10,000 to the owner of the horse that would trot within two minutes, on any track from Hartford to Cleveland inclusive. I was careful to specify the grand circuit tracks, because I knew then what a well-informed writer stated a week ago, that the nature of the race had been sold—had given Indiana and Iowa what he terms 'marvelous tracks.' My offer still holds good, but the performance must be made, of course, to one of the old regulation tracks, the only ones that were in use at the time the race was made. I am frequently asked the question by reporters and others, 'How much faster do you think the new ball-bearing pneumatic sulky is than the old style sulky?' From the trials I have given it and from all the information I can gather from both trainers and owners of horses I feel safe in saying it will average five seconds."

CARROLL IS CAUGHT.

A Notorious Character Cleverly Captured at La Salle.

Charged With Having Assaulted a Girl Dying of Consumption and of Stealing a Gold Watch and \$115.

For some time past Detective B. B. Allen, of this city, and Chief of Police Northgrave, of Ingersoll, have been working on a case and they have at last been rewarded. On the evening of May 2 last, \$115 in cash and a gold watch valued at \$100 were stolen from the safe in the Murray House, Ingersoll. On Aug. 16 Maggie Brownhan, a girl about 19 years of age, lay dying slowly of consumption at her mother's house in the same town. She was alone alone, her mother having gone to the Daly House, where she was employed as cook. The poor girl says that a man named Tim Carroll, alias Cinnamon, alias Sheehan, alias Tom Sims, entered her room and assaulted her. Carroll is about 45 years of age, weighs over 200 pounds, and is said to be a notorious character. When Mrs. Brownhan returned her daughter informed her of what had happened, and Carroll, she says, practically admitted the charge. He was living at the house, and said he meant to spite the young man who was paying attention to the girl.

From Ingersoll he went to Detroit, where, it is alleged, he pawned the gold watch for \$10.50. It has since been recovered. He denies having stolen the money, and says that he found the watch on a chair in the hotel about 6 o'clock on the morning of May 25. Chief of Police Northgrave heard that he had returned to Ingersoll, and on Monday telephoned to Detective Allen. Mr. Allen went to Ingersoll on the afternoon, and in a few hours located his man playing cards in a room on the third story of James McElhonn's hotel at La Salle, a village known as the Port Dover junction of the Michigan Central Railway, about 35 miles from Ingersoll. Mr. Allen, in company with Bailiff Caddy and County Constable J. B. Capron, drove to La Salle, where, after some difficulty, they captured their man. While Detective Allen shook hands with him he clasped the handcuffs on him on the same time. Carroll was taken before Mayor Stephens and Magistrate Chadwick, of Ingersoll, and committed for trial on the charge of criminal assault and larceny of the watch and money.
