THE MODEL SCHOOL
Very Much Crowded—Largest Attendance in Its History—Some of the Pupils.

There is urgent need of increased accommodation at Simcoe street public school, and it is probable the school room of Christ Church will be secured to relieve the crowded condition during the model school term. Since the closing of the school on Waterloo street, it has been necessary to place two teachers in some rooms.

The model school class this year is the largest in the history of the school, there being 45 students in attendance on Thursday, the opening day of the term. About half this number are residents of the city and the others several come from outside of Middlesex county.

Inspector Dearness visited the school on the opening day and delivered a practical, helpful address to the students. He urged them to get to work early and as earnestly as possible. They should start with the intention of climbing to the top of the ladder.

Mr. Dearness, in complimentary terms, referred to the proficiency of the London model school as proved by its past record, and predicted another successful year.

An address was also given by Principal Graham, who spoke in general terms of our present system of education and its evolution in the province.

In the Dining-Room.

SUNDAY, SEPT. 4
• BREAKFAST—Toasted melons. Ham omelet. Toast. Coffee.
• LUNCHEON—Creole Kedgeriee. Thin bread and butter. Florentines. Cucumber jelly. Tea.
• DINNER—Baked veal cutlet. Tomato sauce. Curried potatoes. Sweet pickles. Green corn. Peach cake. Pineapple sherbet.

Cut out these recipes and paste them in a scrap-book.

Ham Omelet—This may be baked, or cooked on top of the stove in a skillet; be sure, however, to grease the latter well. Mince two full tablespoons of ham, with a tiny slice of garlic. If latter is not relished, a teaspoonful of chopped parsley may be substituted. Beat six eggs separately; mix the ham with its relish into the yolks. Take a teaspoon of milk, thicken with a tablespoonful of flour; let it come to a boil and add one tablespoonful of butter and a teaspoonful of salt. Let this cool somewhat, then stir in yolks which have been mixed with the ham; lastly add the frothy whites, stirring very lightly with a knifeblade. Have quick oven; serve very hot. Bake about ten minutes.

Creole Kedgeriee—Any kind of cold fresh fish can be used for this appetizing, inexpensive dish. To one cupful of cold rice, add a dash of oil, a dash of cold butter, a dash of cayenne, a very hard-boiled egg, chopped fine, a slice or so of garlic, or onion, or one full tablespoon curry powder, if preferred. Drop these into a hot skillet; as the butter melts, stir the ingredients well together. It is not intended to fry them, only to thoroughly heat and blend them—five minutes will be enough. Serve on squares of hot, buttered toast, or slices of toasted bread. If curry powder is not the East India article, a little lemon juice may be added.

Cucumber Jelly—This is especially nice to serve with any fish, or it makes a good salad course served with lettuce leaves which have French dressing upon them. Pare four large cucumbers, not too ripe. Cut up and stew in one quart of water with a small onion, full teaspoon salt, one-half teaspoon white pepper. Soak meanwhile half box gelatin in teaspoon cold water. When cucumbers are perfectly soft, stir in the gelatin until it is fully dissolved. Then strain so as to avoid the seeds. Mince cold cucumbers, slice very thin one cucumber line the mold, which has been wet with cold water; with it; pour in the liquid jelly; allow to "set" very firmly. If mixed on platter upon lettuce leaves pour the French dressing over the mold as well as leaves. French dressing is made in proportion of two tablespoons of salad oil to one of vinegar, with half-teaspoon salt.

Florentines, or Fruit Tarts—Can be made of any fruit, stewed if possible in its own juice or with as little water as possible; sweeten well after cooking. Line small crimped pans with the fruit. While still warm drop in the fruit and return to the oven for ten minutes.

—Color-Sergt. Cooper, of Wolsey Barracks, received the sad news by telegraph yesterday of the death of his sister at Harcourt, Mich., and he left for there in the evening to attend the funeral. Color-Sergt. Cooper was one of the jubilee contingent.

—Owing to financial difficulties, the steamer Flora, which has been running between Port Stanley and Cleveland during the summer, has been put off the route; consequently the Labor Day excursion advertiser to leave for Cleveland tonight has been cancelled.

—Mr. C. A. Jones has sold to Mr. Cy Warman, the noted magazine writer, a lot on the corner of Chesapeake and George streets, in the block usually known as the Becher block, opposite the residence of Mr. P. W. D. Brodick. Mr. Warman intends building a residence immediately.

—Mr. Cal. Wilson, for many years with the late firm of John Birrell & Co., and subsequently with R. C. Struthers & Co., left via the C. P. R. yesterday for Vancouver, B. C., where he purposes making his home in future. A large number of his personal friends were at the depot to see him off, and all wished him the greatest success.

—Mr. E. A. Foley, treasurer of the Brotherhood of Trainmen, has returned to Hamilton from Detroit. He says he did not intend going to Oregon, and that his accounts with the brotherhood will be straightened out satisfactorily. Some of the members, he says, became alarmed unnecessarily, as did some of his own friends and even relatives.

—Principal Merchant, of the College Institute, contemplates establishing a purely commercial form at the institute. The subjects to be taught will not be new, but they will embrace fewer studies than were necessary for pupils to take in connection therewith heretofore. The new form will include only English, mathematics, stenography, typewriting, bookkeeping, writing, etc.

—All arrangements for the Labor Day picnic at Port Stanley have been completed by the London Trades and Labor Council, and the labor organizations of St. Thomas. The Seventh Fusiliers Band goes from London and the Twenty-fifth Battalion Band from St. Thomas. Prizes are offered for fancy step dancing, tug-of-war, baseball matches and various other sports. No doubt a large crowd will go both from London and St. Thomas.

—A carload of Niagara fruit passed through the city today on the Grand Trunk, bound from Winona to Winnipeg per Chicago and Grand Trunk Railway to Chicago, and thence by Northern Pacific to its destination. Mr. B. S. Murray, route agent of the Canadian Express Company, accompanied it from London to the tunnel. This is the third consignment of this kind in the present week. The first car left Winona on Tuesday at 9 a.m. and arrived in Winnipeg at noon on Thursday—remarkably good time. The shipment is important, as it opens up a new and promising market for Ontario fresh fruit in Manitoba. The shippers, C. P. Carpenter & Son, were much pleased with the result of the experiment.

—The attraction at the Grand every afternoon and night (beginning Monday matinee) for three nights, will be the moving views of the Queen's diamond jubilee. The Toronto Globe, Aug. 31, says: The more important parts of the procession were shown on the canvas. The first shown represented the Queen's arrival at Windsor on the evening previous to the procession. The figure of her gracious majesty was quite easily recognizable. Altogether, the Queen is seen three times, and a good view of her is to be obtained in each picture. Among the sections of the parade shown were the foreign envoys, the naval brigade and horse artillery, several cavalry bands and the First Horse Guards. The pictures are very distinct and steady. The jubilee pictures are preceded by a number of other scenes equally interesting.

—The death occurred here Thursday of Mr. John Robinson, formerly of Ingersoll and Dereham. The deceased was a respected resident of Ingersoll for several years previous to 1888, carrying on business as a carpenter, afterwards removing to Dereham, where he engaged in farming until 1894, when his health failed, and he returned to Ingersoll, living there until about a year ago. He had reached the ripe age of 86 years, and for the past three years was an invalid. He leaves a family of nine children—David, of West Oxford; Abner, East Zorra; John and Gilbert, London; Mrs. Ralston, Brownsville; Mrs. Weit, Salford; Mrs. J. McKee, Ingersoll; Mrs. Haines, London, and Elizabeth at home.

Pioneers' Day at the Fair in Toronto.

All the Departments in Full Swing—Some of the Noteworthy Features.

Toronto, Sept. 4.—Yesterday was pioneers' and historical day at the fair. The weather was fine, and the attendance large. The usual performance was given in front of the grand stand, including the jubilee procession, with its attendant ceremonies. The full display of live stock was on the grounds, and a grand parade took place in front of the grand stand. One of the notable features is the number of charitable institutions, which from the city and outside, are taking advantage of the exhibition to give those under their care a treat. The Toronto and Mimico asylums and the various institutions for orphans are among them. Among the distinguished visitors yesterday was Lord Chelmsford, the commander of the British forces in South Africa, who defeated the Zulu king, Cetewayo, at the battle of Ulundi.

WARNING TO THE UNWARY.
Toronto, Sept. 4.—Alexander Pingle, a wealthy farmer from Unionville, who is stopping at the Clyde Hotel, Toronto, on Thursday evening fell in with two young men, who invited him down Church street to take some refreshments. Mr. Pingle was not very well acquainted with the neighborhood, so he accompanied the strangers down Church street until they reached the building known as Ontario Caddies, near Front street, where they suddenly turned on him and threw him on his back in the doorway. While one held him down by the throat, the other man rifled his pockets, securing a weighty pocketbook, containing about \$100 in cash, several negotiable promissory notes for considerable amounts, and other valuable papers. The thieves got away.
