THE DIVORCE PROBLEM

Protestant Churches in Conference to Draft a Common Law.

New York, March 24. — Agitation against divorce and the marriage of divorced persons resulted in a meeting here of eminent Protestant ministers and laymen, who will attempt to solve the problem of uniform legislation on the subject by the states of the Union. A meeting of the executive committee of the conference, presided over by Bishop Doane, of Albany, drafted a rough outline of the proposed law which later will be presented to the full meeting for discussion. The conference is a direct result of action taken by the Protestant Episcopal Church in its last general conference at San Francisco.

"Every effort will be made to forever solve the divorce evil, so far as the Protestant churches are concerned," declared Right Rev. David H. Greer, bishop coadjutor of the Episcopal archdiocese of New York. "The Roman Catholic Church was invited to participate in the deliberations of the conference, but declined. The opposition of that church regarding divorce is well known, however.

"Personally, I do not believe in divorce or remarriage, but in separation only. Other gentlemen at the conference may have other views, but it is the purpose of the representatives of Episcopal, Methodist, Presbyterian, Evangelical, Lutheran, Baptist, Congregational, Universalist, Unitarian and Reformed Presbyterian Churches to decide upon some final method involving a comity of relation and uniform practice to treat the great evil of divorce in this country, so that persons who were married under the rites of one church cannot after securing divorces, remarry under the rites of some other Protestant church."

ly creditable one, and extra seating capacity had been provided, but when 8:30, the hour for the opening of business, arrived, it was found necessary to borrow chairs to accommodate the members. The Belvedere Club, which is situated on the floor below, very generously loaned all the chairs necessary.

The meeting, as a whole, was an enthusiastic one, and as reported, report was read, showing that the past year had been one of unprecedented success. The Irishmen threw their hearts and energies into the business of the evening and grew proud in proportion to the success they had achieved. During the evening an almost entirely new set of officers were elected, and the old officers handed over the reins of government to their successors. But while the new men were greeted with every mark of esteem by the members present, the men who had dropped out were not forgotten, and eulogies well put and certainly well deserved were heaped upon Lieut. T. J. Murphy, and Mr. W. A. Martin, the retiring president and secretary respectively. The former was presented with a handsome gold-mounted badge of a past president of the society, and the latter with a splendid gold-mounted umbrella, both presents being suitably engraved, as a mark of the esteem in which the society hold Messrs. Murphy and Martin, both as officers and members of the I. B. S.

The report of Treasurer P. F. Boyle showed the society to be strong financially.

London for the purpose of raising funds to erect a monument to the memory of the London heroes who died on the field in the Boer war, and asking the society to assist.

Ald. Forriest, Messrs. J. W. Pocock, B. C. McCann and others, warmly supported the work being done by the Daughters of the Empire, and the result was that the Irishmen then and there subscribed for two boxes at the Grand for the entertainment, and a large number of members also agreed to be in attendance.

It was unanimously decided to hold a banquet this year, the date to be fixed later on, and a committee was appointed to make a report as to the cost of securing permanent rooms for the society.
