A Grand Stand.

His idea was to build a stand somewhat after the style of a circus stand. This could be torn down and used during Fair week for those who were desirous of watching the judging of the cattle.

Lively and Interesting Debate in the Western University Last Night.

The best and most largely attended meeting that the Western University Literary and Musical Society has ever held took place last night when Convocation Hall was filled.

The feature of the evening was a debate, "Resolved, That Complete National Independence Would Be in the Best Interests of Canada."

The Oxford system of debating for the Western was tried, when instead of having two speakers on a side all the members were allowed to express their views.

New Transportation Building for Fair Board Decides On Big Improvements

A Move Will Be Made To Allow Members To Exhibit in the Classes of Which They Are in Charge.

At a meeting of the Western Fair directors yesterday afternoon, it was decided to build a new transportation building, the present building to be used as an addition to the horse sheds.

Mr. J. H. Brown, superintendent of the grounds and buildings, pointed out that this would give the board the room required for horses.

The erection of a new transportation building would also improve the appearance of the grounds.

Mr. George G. McCormick thought the suggestion was a good one, and moved that the building be erected.

Ald. Saunders, in seconding the motion, thought the new transportation building should not be as large as the old one, in order to force exhibitors to show exhibition goods.

The motion carried.
