Klincke, of Buffalo, Has Been Signed To Play the Keystone Sack.

The signed contract of William Klincke, the Buffalo second baseman, was received today by Manager Wreath, of the Londons. Klincke played with the Erie, Pa., team in the Interstate League in 1905 and 1906. He led the league in batting and was the best fielding second baseman. Klincke led the batting order for nis team during the two seasons he played in Erie and he was looked upon as being of the real material.

In the latter part of 1906 Klincke was sold to the Louisville, American Association team, but failed to make good on account of the climate in the south, which brought him down with the fever and left him in a weakened condition. Later Klincke played with Latrobe, Pa., in the Western Pennsylvania League, and stuck until the eam disbanded.
