BANKRUPT STOCK MAN

expenses. She had not been asked to do
the work by Head. She had charge of the
cash, while Patten kept the bank account.
Despite this, the witness had done the
greater part of the work.

The stock was taken from North Bay
about the last of March. Asked if he and
Patten had been drunk for some time
before the witness denied it, but stated
that "might have been a little off one
night." He did not spend any of the
firm's funds, neither did he spend all the
money he had in his possession, although
he had \$20 of personal funds.

The Bank Manager.
Mr. Preston, manager of the Traders'
Bank at Ripley, was then called, as he
desired to leave on the 4:30 train. He pro-
duced the original ledger of the firm's ac-
count at the bank. There had been some
trouble on one occasion, when the plain-
tiff presented an order for the full
amount to Patten & Co.'s credit. This
order was refused, as the signature was
not sufficient. The ledger leaf showed the
deposits and withdrawals of the firm.

Mr. Meredith made a strong plea for the
defendant, and asked the magistrate to
draw the funds of the firm in which he
had an interest. On several occasions
Patten had opportunities to make good
greater amounts, but had not done so.

His honor was of the opinion that the
defendant did not intentionally commit a
criminal action, but that he committed a
dishonest action in appropriating the
funds to his own use when there was still
an opportunity of adjusting matters. That
he done what was right he would have
left the money until matters were settled
satisfactorily.

Under such conditions he could not see
his way clear to dismiss the case, but
would send the defendant to trial at the
general sessions. Bail was allowed \$1,000
personal, and sureties for \$1,000.

A SOUTH AFRICAN
VETERANS' ASSOCIATION
The London Branch Was Formed at
a Meeting Held Last Night.

A branch of the South African Vet-
erans' Association of Canada was
formed in this city last evening, to be
known as the South African Associa-
tion of Military District No. 1. The
move was made at a meeting of about
twenty local veterans in the Armories.

The main aim of the association, as
is well known, is the modification of the
Dominion law in regard to the grants
of land in the west, given the veteran.
By the Government. Permission is de-
sired to allow substitutes to perform
the necessary settlement duties.

A delegate to the general convention,
to be held shortly in Winnipeg, was
appointed in the person of Mr. Harry
Chapman, of that city, formerly of
London. The following executive com-
mittee was elected: Messrs. J. A.
Wilson, J. Y. Yarn, J. S. Larke, the
Sydney, reports that last year Cana-
dian sold to the New Dominion goods
to a value of \$205,536, as against only
\$52,374 in 1902. In the same time we
bought from New Zealand \$78,015
worth as against \$7,368 worth in 1902.

The trade in printing paper has
grown from \$18,752 in 1905 to \$23,-
599 in 1906 and \$20,555 in 1907. Most
of this was sent from Ottawa.
New Zealand has prohibited the im-
portation of prison-made goods and as
the United States has been sending
there a quantity of harvesting tools
made by the convicts there is a good
chance of Canadian manufacturers to
increase their trade with the southern
colony.

Ottawa, Sept. 28.—Canada's trade
with New Zealand is increasing by

ITALY, AUSTRIA
AS PEACEMAKERS

**Ministers Plan to Prevent Rup-
ture Between Germany and
England or France?**

Rome, Sept. 28.—The meeting be-
tween Signor Tittoni, Italian minister
of foreign affairs, and Baron Aehren-
thal, Austrian minister of foreign af-
fairs, which took place at Salzburg,
having come after the many other
meetings which occurred during the
summer among sovereigns and states-
men, has assumed a special impor-
tance, particularly because Signor
Tittoni had first an interview with
Baron von Schoen, German minister
of foreign affairs. Notwithstanding
the efforts to keep the reasons of the
meeting secret it is now known that
the discussion was on three principal
subjects—Anglo-German relations, the
situation in Turkey and the Moroccan
question.

The question of the relations be-
tween England and Germany affects
both Austria and Italy, as both have
traditionally followed a policy of
friendship with England, while they
are both now pledged to support Ger-
many on account of the triple alli-
ance. This situation is especially
grave for Italy, as she cannot possibly
have Great Britain as an enemy in
the Mediterranean. From this point
of view the present conditions are
worse than those last spring, as the
Cronberg meeting between King Ed-
ward and the Kaiser, which was con-
sidered a complete fiasco. The
British ruler attempted again to limit
his armaments; the latter answered
with his boast at Strasbourg, which
sounded more like a war cry. Aehren-
thal and Tittoni agreed to do all in
their power to have the combined
Austro-Italian influence used in Eng-
land, as well as in Germany, to clear
away the present clouds.

With regard to the situation in
Turkey, it was decided to wait further
developments in the new regime, al-
though complications are feared in
Bosnia and Herzegovina, where a
strong anti-Austrian party is working
for the autonomy of these provinces,
or for their reunion to the Turkish em-
pire, now that constitutional govern-
ment is established.

Finally Morocco again divides the
powers as before, and during the
Algeiras conference, Germany, sup-
ported by Austria, wishes to acknow-
ledge the new Sultan, Mulai Hanid,
while France desires to temporize, and
is backed by England and Spain. Italy
is in the usual state of embarrassment,
because, while allied to Germany and
Austria, she has special arrangements
with France and England regarding
the Mediterranean.

She must therefore try to repeat the
game she played at Algeiras—that of
not falling between two stools. At
the new Sultan, Mulai Hanid, is
represented by one of her most authori-
tative and influential men, Marquis Vi-
sconti, the American representative,
Signor Tittoni is able to repeat suc-
cessfully that policy? He is trying it
now with Von Schoen and with Aeh-
renthal?

MINISTER'S ABSENCE
CAUSES COMMENT
Failed to Appear and Preach His
Farewell Sermon.

Sarnia, Sept. 28.—The non-appear-
ance of Rev. Mr. Evans at St. John's
Anglican Church on Sunday is the
subject of much comment. Mr. Evans
had been announced to preach his fare-
well sermon prior to starting for Eng-
land on a six months' leave of ab-
sence. He was also announced to hold
harvest festival services at the Eng-
lish Church on the Sarnia reserve on
Sunday afternoon, but he failed to put
in an appearance there. Rev. Mr.
Evans left town Saturday afternoon,
and as yet has not returned or given
any explanation regarding his absence.

Mrs. Emma E., wife of Mr. S.Wm.
Eady, of Talford street, died at the
Sarnia General Hospital, Sunday, from
typhoid fever, after an illness of three
weeks. The remains were taken to the
residence of her brother-in-law, Wm.
Dunlop, Petrolia, and the funeral will
be held from there to Hillsdale Cem-
tery.

A Port Huron boy named Samuel
Anter narrowly escaped drowning in
sight of several hundred people in St.
Clair River, opposite Pine Grove Park,
Sunday afternoon. The boy got be-
hind his depth and was going down
for the third time, when Bart Alexan-
der jumped into the river with all of
his clothes on and safely brought
young Anter to shore.

DROPPED 6,000 FEET
Two Prussian Aeronauts Have Re-
markable Adventure.

Dusseldorf, Rhenish Prussia, Sept.
28.—Captain Von Abercron and Lieut.
Van Goltzheim, two well-known aéro-
nauts, had a marvellous escape from
death yesterday during the course of
an ascent in a spherical balloon.
Thousands of spectators had gathered
to witness the ascent, and they were
horror-stricken at the accident, which
occurred high in the air.

On being released from its fasten-
ings, the balloon soared almost up-
wards to an altitude of 6,000 feet
when the envelope suddenly ripped
open. The gas escaped in a stream,
and the balloon shot downward. The
aeronauts swiftly clambered into the
network in the desperate hope of
avoiding the shock of contact with the
ground. After a fall of 2,000 feet how-
ever the envelope spread out, seem-
ingly in a purely accidental manner,
forming a sort of parachute which
checked the descent. The balloon then
gradually came down, taking an hour
and a half to reach the earth, the
two men clinging to the ropes of the
basket. They suffered no injury ex-
cept a few scratches.

The cause of the accident was the
sudden expansion of the gas.
