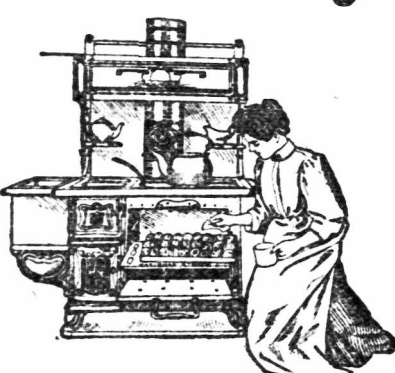

DOUBLE SESSIONS FOR KINDERGARTENS

The Board of Education Finally Settled the Matter Yesterday Afternoon.

WILL NOTIFY TEACHERS

All Have Until Dec. 10 to Apply for Reinstatement—Reorganization Will Commence at Once.

London kindergartens will hereafter be run on the double-session principle, and No. 1 committee will commence the work of reorganization at once. The teachers will be given until Dec. 10 to apply, and then if there are not sufficient teachers to run the schools they will be advertised for.

At the meeting of the board of education yesterday afternoon this decision was arrived at. The motion of City Solicitor Meredith was read to the effect that the motion calling for the double sessions was valid and would stand.

Motion Was Valid.
It will be remembered that at a recent meeting of the board some of the members were of the opinion that it required a two-thirds vote of the board to change the sessions, as it involved a change in the rules.

Chairman Westervelt would not give his opinion until he consulted with City Solicitor Meredith. The latter gave it as his opinion as mentioned above, that the board amended not rules but regulations, therefore, a two-thirds vote was not necessary. Consequently the motion passed was valid.

Notify Each Teacher.
When this question had been settled Trustee Graham moved that the kindergarten teachers be notified individually of the reorganization staff, and asking those who desire to apply for positions under the two-session plan a day to do so before Dec. 10.

In case there are not sufficient teachers at that time the committee are to advertise for them.

The Supervisor.
Trustee Strong then moved that the board engage Miss Jean R. Lobbard, the present supervisor, at her present salary, and outlined her duties in the motion also.

"That is not an amendment," said Chairman Westervelt. "I do not think it is in order." said Trustee Graham. "The committee will have power to deal with that matter. I hope Miss Lobbard will be retained by the board."

Trustee Teasdale thought that the matter was being dealt with in a haphazard manner. The teachers should be notified at once, and the location of classes, and other essential things.

Trustee Weckes pointed out that the question of detail would be arranged when No. 1 committee and the inspector took up the question. The kindergartens should not be treated differently from other teachers.

Trustee Weckes is trying all round the question, answered Trustee Teasdale. "The primary teachers know where their classes are located and all about it. The kindergartens should be treated as well as the primary teachers."

Leave It to the Board.
When the recommendation of No. 1 committee comes to the board, the question can be settled in a minute," said Chairman Westervelt. "We had better wait until a recommendation is received."

Trustee Gault thought that most of the difficulty was due to misapprehension and misunderstanding between the parties. He suggested that a conference be arranged between the kindergartens and the committee, when the whole question could be taken up.

For Double Sessions.
"I see no reason why I should go back on my stand for double sessions," said Trustee Gault. "I think that they will work out most satisfactorily. Our duty is to work out the scheme with the least possible friction. I think the teachers will stand loyally behind the board in this matter. I hope that Miss Lobbard will be retained. I am certain that she will be the first person with whom the committee should confer when the staff is being reorganized."

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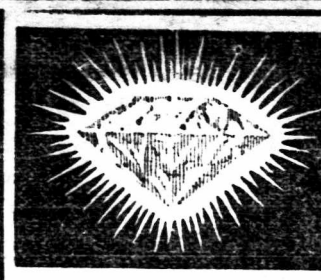
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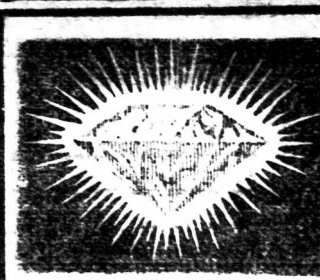
