#### TIP FOR THE HUNTER

A) e you going hunting this fall?

Are you planning a trip into the woods?

If so, it won't do any harm to recall to mind the recent forest fires with their toll of human life and dollars.

A little precaution on your part may save a repetition of this The regulations of the New York State Forest, Fish and Game Commission, applying to fires, may well be adhered to by campers and sportsmen in every part of the country. The essential part

"The state expends large sums in preserving the forests as a pleasure resort and asks those enjoying its pleasures to contribute their share by guarding carefully against fire.
"Fires will be permitted for the purpose of cooking, warmth

and insect smudges on state land; standing timber shall not be used

"Fires must not be started on the leaves; all combustible material must be cleared away five feet from the fire.

'A sand beach or dry creek bed is the safest fireplace. "Fires must be thoroughly quenched, not covered up or stamped out.

"The ground beneath should be saturated with water. "Fires must not be started against stumps, trees, or near piles of logs or brush.

"Fires other than those mentioned above are absolutely prohib-

"Caution must be exercised against allowing fires to originate from the use of firearms, pipes and cigars." Just let this sink in. During the dry season it is hard enough to prevent fires arising from other causes than neglect and foolishness. Conflagrations frequently start from natural causes. Only those who have been in the woods when fire is raging can appreclate how serious a fire can grow from a spark in the leaves, or

The camper who is planning a week or two in the woods, may be somewhat inconvenienced, but he may save millions of dollars by insisting that a pail, filled with water, be kept constantly in every tent. It wouldn't be going too far if every camping party added a patent fire extinguisher to the outfit. They don't take up much room and are death on flames.

QUITE BRISK AT TORONTO

Bradstreet's Review of the Commercial Situation in the Dominion.

Montreal reports to Bradstreet's say general trade has had a much quieter tone than was reported last week. The thousands of visitors here for the Euch-aristic Congress have left for home, but the result of their presence is seen in the large number of orders which wholesale houses have from many country results. sale houses have from many country re-tailers who were in. Seasonable fall weather has given a good impetus to the show improvement, and the likelihood for a poor fall and winter as was predicted for some parts of the west seems much more remote than a month ago. A good seasonable business is moving in drygoods, and prices generally seem steady to firm. The threatened lock-out in the English cotton mills is having an un-steadying effect upon the market for prints, etc. The demand for most staple groceries if of normal proportions, although the inquiry for sugar is very light, due, no doubt, to the high prices at which fruit has ruled. A good trade in general hardware is reported. As is natural, city collections are good after the heavy trade of the past week or two, but those from the country are a little slow.

Brisk at Toronto.

Toronto reports to Bradstreet's say all lines of fall trade are now moving briskly, and indications are that the turnover will be considerably heavier than that of last year. Western shipthan that of last year. Western shipments of general lines are particularly satisfactory. Heavy shipments are going by lake and rail freights, and this movement will continue until the close of navigation. Retail trade has been good, and a good sorting up business in drygoods is noted. In clothing a particularly good season seems to be assured. While the outlook for winter trade has never been anything but good here also there the outlook for winter trade has never been anything but good, here also there has been improvement during the past week. A steady trade is noted for groceries and prices show little change. Seasonable hardware is moving briskly. The building trades keep active, and there is an excellent demand for iron and steel. Country trade holds a steady tone. Deliveries of products are fair and prices generally hold firm generally hold firm

The exhibit in horses was of the best, especially in heavy classes, and some very fine matched teams were The cattle show, especially in Short






