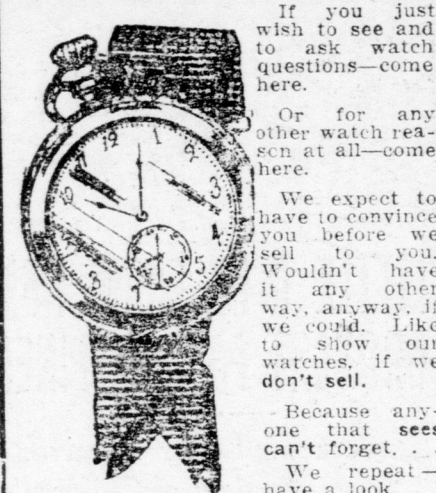

**NEW HEART FOR  
PHONE SYSTEM OF  
THE FOREST CITY**

Transfer To the Newly-Installed  
Switchboard Made on  
Saturday.

The Interesting and Intricate  
"Cutover" Operation Made  
Without a Hitch.

For three seconds on Saturday after-  
noon every telephone in London was  
out of commission, a condition of af-  
fairs which has not occurred for some-  
thing like fifteen years, and which is  
not likely to occur again for as many  
years more.

At the end of that extremely short  
space of time, every telephone line,  
with the exception of the long-distance  
lines, which runs into the central office  
of the Bell Telephone Company on  
Park avenue, had been transferred to  
the newly-installed switchboard in the  
new building.

"Cut-Over" Operation.

It was what is known among tele-  
phone men as the "cut-over," an op-  
eration which on account of its rarity  
is an event of unusual interest, and  
because of the danger of a wide-  
spread tie-up in telephone service,  
should anything go wrong, is also the  
occasion of much anxiety on the part  
of the engineers in charge. Saturday's  
event at the local office of the Bell went  
off without a hitch. The breathless  
anxiety of the three seconds during  
which the "cut" was being made was  
rewarded by the sight of flashing lights  
on the new board, showing that sub-  
scribers were in touch with "central"  
again.

To one ignorant of the coming event,  
there was little about the "operation"  
room to excite comment. "Number  
number" "Lines busy," etc., came in a  
regular monotone from the long row  
of operators seated at the old local  
board.

But in the room below, how differ-  
ent was the scene. Engineers, elec-  
tricians and mechanics moved hither  
and thither, examining, consulting, ad-  
vising, all bent on insuring the per-  
fect working of the myriad maze of  
wires before them. There was a sup-  
pressed air of excitement, for not one  
but knew the consequences that would  
inevitably follow a slight oversight or  
error in construction. And, as they  
worked, testing, testing, everywhere.

**The New Switchboard.**  
On the next floor stood the new  
switchboard—a thing of beauty and  
perfection in construction, but lacking  
that subtle current of electricity, which  
coursing through the thousands of  
wires which interlaced themselves  
through its interior like the venous  
system in the human body, was to give  
it life.

"Cut-over" was set for 5 o'clock.  
At that hour a little knot of officials  
gathered in the room to which a num-  
ber of spectators had also been admit-  
ted. Presently, from the old switch-  
board, the empty shell of a 22-cal-  
iber, they took their places and  
waited. Four electricians also took  
up stations at the end of the board to  
pull out at exactly the right moment  
the thousands of little metal plugs  
which held the various lines in the city  
in touch with the old board. To each  
in turn, which resembled a 22-cal-  
iber, the empty shell of a 22-cal-  
iber, was attached a wire, and  
these wires were gathered together in  
cables containing over a thousand each,  
so that all could be pulled out simulta-  
neously.

**A New Head.**  
Facing a marble slab in the room  
below stood Mr. F. W. Beedle, chief en-  
gineer of the power plant. With him  
rested the responsibility of throwing  
the switch to the new board. At exactly  
7 minutes and 30 seconds after 5  
o'clock all was pronounced to be in  
readiness, and he turned on the cur-  
rent.

Yank! Yank! With deft jerks, the  
men upstairs pulled their coils and the  
plugs fell rattling to the floor in  
showers.

Instantly the tiny lights on the  
board began to twinkle. The telephone  
system of London had a new heart.

"Number! Number!" again hummed  
through the room, and the supervisor  
peered up and down the length of the  
board directing the work of the op-  
erators. The old board was "dead." The self.

Over \$64,000,000**

[Canadian Press.]  
New York, Sept. 22.—The first official  
figures that show the amount of  
the estate left by Russel Sage, the  
financier, who died on July 23, 1904,  
are contained, it developed today, in  
papers on file in the county clerk's  
office in the suit brought by the state  
of New York against the Mercantile  
Safe Deposit Company, in whose vault  
Mr. Sage had deposited many mil-  
lion dollars' worth of securities.

Mr. Sage is shown by the papers to  
have a gross personal estate valued at  
\$64,411,218. His real estate was ap-  
praised at \$1,945,500. Mrs. Margaret  
Olivia Sage, the widow, received \$63-  
503,800, on which the estate paid a  
tax of \$635,038. The rest of the estate  
went to twenty-eight nephews, nieces,  
grand-nephews and grand-nieces of  
Mr. Sage, each receiving \$25,000.
