

ENEMY'S SUBMARINES SINK THREE MORE BRITISH SHIPS

Sent To Bottom Without Warning, and Thirty-seven Are Drowned—Raiders' Activity Extends Around England.

LONDON, March 9.—During the early hours of Tuesday morning German submarines sent their presence known at three widely separated points on the British coast, and it is stated officially, without giving warning to their crews, sank three British merchant ships.

In one case, that of the steamer *Tangistan*, which was torpedoed off Scarborough, in the North Sea, 37 men of her crew of 55 are missing. Only one man from the vessel was picked up, he by a passing ship. The attack which sent the *Tangistan* to the bottom was made half an hour after midnight.

At 6 o'clock in the morning another submarine sank the steamer *Blackwood* off Hastings, in the English Channel, while a third submarine sank the steamer *Princess Victoria*, off Liverpool, at a quarter past nine o'clock.

The news of the latest exploits of the German submarines came just as the British public was congratulating themselves that the threatened German sea blockade had been a failure.

Official announcements were issued as follows:
"The steamer *Tangistan* was sunk by a German submarine off Scarborough at 12:30 o'clock, the morning of March 9. Only one man of her crew of 55 men was saved."

"The steamer *Blackwood* was sunk by a submarine, without warning, off Hastings at 6 o'clock the morning of March 9. Her crew of 17 was saved."

"The steamer *Princess Victoria*, of Glasgow, was sunk without warning by a German submarine at 9:15 o'clock the morning of March 9 off Liverpool. Her crew of 31 was saved."

TANGISTAN GOES DOWN IMMEDIATELY.
WEST HARTLEPOOL (via London). March 9.—The crew of 55 men of the British steamer *Tangistan* all were drowned, except one man, according to the statement made by the sole survivor of the vessel, who has been landed here by the steamer *Woodville*.

"The *Tangistan*," said this man, "was torpedoed off Scarborough. She was struck amidships and went down almost immediately. All the members of the crew were in the lifeboats, but they were unable to dismount and dragged down the boats with her. I caught hold of a piece of wreckage and clung to it for nearly three hours in the icy water until I was rescued."

The survivor of the *Tangistan* is James O'Toole, an Englishman. Sixteen men of the crew were English and the remainder Irish. The boats had already been swung out in view of a possible submarine attack and most of the men on board wore life belts, when the vessel was torpedoed.

O'Toole said later that four other men caught pieces of wreckage and remained afloat for some time.

OBSERVED TWO SUBMARINES.
NEW HAVEN, Eng. (via London). March 10.—1:25 a.m. The captain and crew of the steamer *Blackwood*, which was sunk off Hastings at 6 o'clock Tuesday morning, were landed here Tuesday night. They say that their vessel, laden with coal and other cargo, was torpedoed during a stormy sea on the morning of March 9, about 10 miles south of Dunquerque, without warning.

Fortunately, in view of the submarine sea zone menace, the men say they had their boats swung out and ready for launching, and that, therefore, all of them were saved. Nobody on board the steamer was injured. The vessel sank within ten minutes after she was struck.

According to the statement, a submarine was observed just ahead of the *Blackwood*, but her number could not be seen. One of the officers says he saw the periscope of another submarine close by the *Blackwood*.

SPEED SAVED CLAN MACRAE.
LIVERPOOL, via London, March 10.—1:15 a.m.—The *Clan Line* steamer, *Clan Macrae*, was chased by a German submarine off the coast of the Mersey bar, in the Irish sea, yesterday (Tuesday) morning for 25 minutes.

The steamer escaped by zig-zagging at top speed.

The *Clan Macrae* left Port Natal, January 21, for Liverpool.

BAD BLAZE AT HAMILTON.
HAMILTON, March 9.—Fire tonight did damage to the extent of \$10,000 to the building occupied by W. L. Brock & Company, the Laurel Manufacturing Company and the Boy Scouts. The firemen had considerable difficulty in handling the blaze. Much damage was done to stock and fixtures by water.

GERMANY APOLOGIZES TO U. S. AMBASSADOR.

Promises Interruption of Mail Will Not Occur Again.

THE HAGUE (via London), March 9.—10:15 p.m.—The German Foreign Office has sent, through James W. Gerard, the American ambassador in Germany, an expression of regret and an explanation to Henry Van Dyke, the American minister to Holland and Luxembourg, regarding the interruption of Dr. Van Dyke's correspondence with Luxembourg.

CENSORSHIP AGAIN CRITICIZED BY PRESS.

British Papers Think Canadian Comment Should Have Been Passed.

LONDON, March 10.—The evening Star (Liberal), commenting on the debate in the House of Commons Monday on the action of the censor, Sir Stanley Burdett, in suppressing comment on the promotion of Colonel Seely, M. P., to be brigadier-general, and his appointment to command the Canadian troops in the action of the Marston, says: "We have no sympathy with the critics of that appointment, but it is a strong order to suppress entirely the utterances of Canadian critics."

The Globe thinks that the principle involved in the action of the censor is dangerous in the extreme. "So far as the bureau of the censor is concerned," it adds, "the British public is not to be allowed to have evidence on so vital a fact as the manner in which the people of the Great Dominion regard the qualifications for office of a politician to whom has been entrusted the command of troops sent us. If Buckmaster's plea of military necessity is to be accepted, Haldane might be substituted for Kitchener and the press forbidden to comment adversely."

LET NEW TAX AID CANADIANS SAFELY CAUSE OF ALIEN LAND IN ENGLAND.

Rowell Suggests Government Devote Funds to Cause of War.

NOT FOR EXTRAVAGANCE GET HEARTY RECEPTION.

Expenses in Ten Years Have Increased by 186 Per Cent.

TORONTO, March 9.—Warm passages between the Liberal leader and the Prime Minister characterized the closing speeches of the budget debate in the Legislature today, and for the first time in many years the budget was passed and the House went into committee of supply without an Opposition amendment. While Mr. Rowell maintained to the letter the party "true," he did not find himself bound to refrain from a criticism of the policy of "wanton extravagance" that has brought the province to the era of direct taxation. It was futile to claim that the war was responsible for the present situation.

Direct Taxation.
"It is just taxation," he said, "rendered necessary by the manner in which the finances of this province have been handled by the Government. Direct taxation is necessary for the wasterful expenditure of large sums of public money, in respect of which the province is facing this situation today."

The Prime Minister went to some length to prove that the falling off in revenue was directly attributable to the war, and that the cause of the failure in crown land revenue and the refusal of the life insurance directors to pay the new tax. He had little sympathy with the directors of these companies and met the claim that they should not be called to pay by showing that they reached their decision to fight the tax weeks after the war broke out.

Mr. Rowell's Suggestion.
At the outset of his speech, Mr. Rowell said that so far as the Opposition was concerned, it would give its cordial support to the Government in making whatever contributions to the allied cause necessity might dictate. "I venture now to make this suggestion," said Mr. Rowell, "that as the (Provincial Treasurer) has told us, the entire proceeds of this tax will be devoted to war purposes, I believe the people of Ontario would like in some effective way to make a direct and immediate contribution which would tell in the front ranks of the war effort."

Mr. Rowell said that the Government for consideration whether they could not, through the proper channels, consult the imperial authorities as to the manner in which the balance of the money raised under this act could be most effectively employed towards the allies, and bring this war to a successful termination. We might do it by providing a base hospital somewhere near the fighting line, or by making some direct contribution to the allied cause of the war (Annapolis) and I would further venture to suggest that whatever the imperial authorities should suggest as most desirable and most effective in accomplishing the purpose we have in view, the Government would be actually in accordance with the will of the people of the province in whatever steps they might take to carry it out."

How Expenditures Grow.
Analyzing the financial statement, Mr. Rowell showed that the actual income for the year, apart from borrowings and cash balances was \$10,747,768, while expenditures were \$20,976,461, practically two for one. The income in 1904 was \$2,122,337; in 1914, \$10,747,768, an increase of 75 per cent. The expenditure for the same period was \$10,826,433; in 1914, \$20,976,461, an increase of 94 per cent. The deficit on current account over ordinary income was \$1,204,471. The public debt had correspondingly gone up from \$1,798,651 to \$4,405,000.

Further.
